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1	NP ROBBINS: This assembly will now come
2	to order. Shipmate Master at Arms, will you
3	invite the shipmates to enter the hall and close
4	the doors? Thank you, Shipmate Master at Arms.
5	Shipmate National Chaplain, would you
6	please give the opening prayer? Open the Bible,
7	I'm sorry.
8	NCHAP BAILEY: Shipmate National
9	President, the Bible is open.
10	NP ROBBINS: Thank you. You all can
11	pray privately. Salute the colors. Two.
12	I'm sorry. Now, I was told I have a
13	very sensitive mic up here, so I've got to not
14	kill the podium. Shipmate Junior Past?
15	JPNP CAMPBELL: Shipmate National
16	President, the junior past president is present
17	in the uniform of the day.
18	NP ROBBINS: The only reason why you're
19	smiling is because you ain't wearing a top.
20	I now declare the third business session
21	of the 95th convention regular convened.

1	I need to finish one thing from
2	yesterday that I did before I get to you. It was
3	the youth activity, right? No, hospital and
4	welfare. We had a motion on the floor and we had
5	a second on hospital and welfare, and we never
6	voted on it. So, that's my fault.
7	So, is there any discussion, if you
8	remembered the report? Any discussion to accept
9	the report and all of his representations that
10	went with it? Being that there's no further
11	discussion, all in favor say aye.
12	(Chorus of ayes.)
13	All those opposed? Thank you. That
14	one's good.
15	The chair requests that the credential
16	committee provide the third report if there have
17	been any changes. Shaking your head don't work
18	in the microphone.
19	S/M HATLIFF: Shipmate National
20	President, Shipmate Hatliff, Branch 49, chairman.
21	The credentials committee presents the

1	credentials report dated 28 September 2023 at
2	0900. The convention worksheet is located at
3	Tab F Yankee.
4	Authorized voting strength, 876.
5	Branches represented by delegates, 48. Votes
6	represented by delegates, 455. Branches
7	represent by proxies, 70. Votes registered by
8	proxy, 323. Branches not registered, 29. Number
9	of registered delegates, 89. Registered voting
10	strength, 778. Votes not registered, 98.
11	Two-thirds voting strength, 519. Majority vote,
12	390.
13	On behalf of the committee, I move that
14	the role of the delegates hereby submitted be the
15	official role of the voting members of this
16	committee.
17	NVP HANDZUK: Handzuk, delegate, 126,
18	seconds.
19	NP ROBBINS: I have a motion on the
20	floor and I have a second. Any discussion? Any
21	discussion? No further discussion? All in favor

1	say aye.
2	(Chorus of ayes.)
3	Any opposed? Thank you, Shipmate.
4	Okay, shipmates, I have to do a little
5	operation. I have to let a committee go first
6	because they're going to have to leave the
7	meeting hall, s I'd rather get him out of the way
8	and when he's got to leave, I'll let him leave.
9	Veterans service, Shipmate Paul Phelps.
10	S/M PHELPS: Thank you, Shipmate
11	National President. Shipmate National President,
12	shipmates and guests. Okay. So I'm going to
13	commence going through veterans services.
14	First I need to do a little bit of
15	explaining, so when I get ready to announce the
16	winners, it will make sense to you. If you go to
17	the last page in your book, flip over and go to
18	where it says veterans services for me. What I
19	want you to do above where it says group one,
20	group two, group three, group four and groups
21	five, draw a line down the middle of each one of

1	those so you have two columns please. The first
2	one will be for VABS, the second one will be for
3	VSO for each of the groups, and then you'll line
4	up for your first, second and third when I tell
5	you who it is. Does everybody understand? All
6	right, thank you so much.
7	Okay. The national convention committee
8	on veterans services met Red Room 8 of the Nugget
9	Casino Resort, Sparks, Nevada, on Wednesday,
10	September 27th, 2023 at 0900. Present was myself
11	as the chair. My members were Past Regional West
12	Coast William Matthews, Modesto Branch 197. My
13	advisor was ADLT Theo Lawson from the Navy
14	Department Branch 181. And then my visitor was
15	Past Regional President Northeast/New England
16	James Brown, Branch 226, and then Shipmate Chuck
17	Jameson from Branch 230, Shipmate Claude Smiley
18	from Branch 99 and Shipmate Eugene Gonzalez from
19	Branch 93.
20	I helped educate the new members first
21	time being to something of this nature about what

1	we were getting ready to do, and I needed one
2	more shipmate to help grade all the different
3	reports that I had, and Shipmate Chuck Jameson,
4	first time, jumped right in and said hey, I'm
5	here to help, and he became one of my yeah, I
6	lost it ratings, right, to get the grading.
7	Because as you know now, in our committee, we
8	actually have grading sheets, and so this new
9	person including Theo, myself and Matthews, we
10	all got to see it work its wonders again as we
11	worked through. You heard another committee talk
12	about how long they were in session; we were in
13	session for two-and-a-half hours until we got
14	through everything and if it wasn't for the
15	grading sheets, it would have been longer than
16	that.
17	So we of course continue to oversee the
18	veterans service office and the various volunteer
19	service programs providing education outreach to
20	the members of the association, including the
21	policies and regulations associated with these

1	programs. We report on the number and activities
2	of the accredited VSO and representatives in the
3	VABS program in each region. We solicit branches
4	and shipmates to become involved in Department of
5	Veterans Affairs services on the state, local and
6	national level, including VA regional offices,
7	medical facilities, state and national veteran
8	cemeteries or veterans homes.
9	And we annually recognize an outstanding
10	service by a shipmate in service to veterans. We
11	then proceeded to review and grade the reports
12	submitted by the regions. They are as follows:
13	First place, group one, Branch number
14	99, Kempsville, east coast. First place, group
15	two, Branch number 161, MO-KAN, east coast and
16	I think that's wrong, thank you. I knew you'd
17	correct me. Hey, I had the second letter right,
18	C, I just put the second letter wrong and then I
19	read it wrong. I apologize. Yeah, I was running
20	trying to get this done. I don't know if you
21	caught it yesterday, but I come in at the last

1	moment, I was one of the last ones.
2	NP ROBBINS: Shipmates, please be
3	respectful to the speaker at the podium.
4	S/M PHELPS: Shipmate at the mic.
5	SPEAKER: (Inaudible) delegate. Is this
6	VSO first, or VABS?
7	S/M PHELPS: I thought I said it's VABS.
8	It's okay, VABS is first, so I'll go back.
9	Group one, Branch 99, Kempsville, East
10	Coast. Group two, first place, Branch 161,
11	MO-KAN, north central. Group three, first place,
12	Branch number 181, Navy Department, east coast.
13	Group four, Branch number 382, Gem state,
14	northwest. And group five, first place, Branch
15	number 274, High Sierra, west coast.
16	Second place, still VABS, group one, we
17	didn't have any. Group two, Branch number 97,
18	Whidbey Island, northwest. Group three, we
19	didn't have one. Group four, Branch number 23,
20	Buffalo, Northeast/New England. Group five,
21	Branch number 32, Lake of the Ozarks, north

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1	central.
2	Third place. Group one, not applicable.
3	Group two, not applicable. Group three, not
4	applicable. Group four, Branch number 197,
5	Modesto, west coast. And group five, Branch
6	number 309, Diamond state, east coast.
7	Now we'll move on to VSO. First place,
8	group one, not applicable. Group two, Branch
9	number 97, Whidbey Island, northwest. Group
10	three, Branch number 181, Navy Department, east
11	coast. Group four, Branch number 382, Gem state,
12	northwest. Group five, Branch number 38,
13	Spokane, northwest.
14	Second place, not applicable for group
15	one. Group two, Branch number 302, Carson,
16	southwest. Group three, not applicable. Group
17	four, Branch number 23, Buffalo, Northeast/New
18	England. Group five, Branch number 41, Roanoke,
19	east coast.
20	And finally, third place, group one, not
21	applicable. Group two, not applicable. Group

1	three, not applicable. Group four, Branch number
2	197, Modesto, west coast. And group five, Branch
3	number 178, Monterey, west coast.
4	For the first time since I've been
5	involved with veterans services and what, we've
б	been around four or five years now, maybe six at
7	the most, there were four submissions for ship
8	mate of the year, okay? Yeah, we were ecstatic,
9	it was like unheard of, but guess what, right?
10	We had to go on even longer because we now had
11	to, we're not right there at the end yet. But
12	after much deliberation and going through the
13	four, the committee did select Shipmate Laurie
14	Cody, this is personal, from Branch 40, east
15	coast region, as the shipmate of the year for
16	veterans services.
17	Anybody that knows me knows that
18	Shipmate Laurie is my mentor. And you see the
19	passion that I have; multiply it by 20 or plus.
20	She doesn't come to these things because she's
21	out there helping the shipmates, okay, and that's

1	Branch 40 out of Chesapeake, Virginia.
2	So I want to thank the committee members
3	for the dedication, commitment and their input
4	throughout the past year. Those of you that
5	attended my meeting, you probably saw things a
б	little differently, I hope you took it to light
7	and that we all had a good time and there was
8	information that got passed out. I once again
9	apologize for the confusion that happened about
10	trying to produce the grading sheets that we
11	used.
12	But I think now that we've been through
13	the national convention and it's coming to the
14	end, you know, we got through the committee
15	reports. I'm already starting to get additional
16	positive feedback about that having been in
17	place, and I highly recommend that the other
18	committees, if you don't understand what I'm
19	talking about, please come and see me. I am
20	leaving after this session, but I will not get on
21	the bus until noon.

1	So the last thing I'll leave you with is
2	I do have the ribbons, so please come and see wee
3	when we get to the appropriate time. Thank you,
4	Shipmate National President, for the opportunity
5	to serve our shipmates, and I move that my report
6	be accepted.
7	NP ROBBINS: Thank you.
8	SPEAKER: (Inaudible) delegate, second.
9	NP ROBBINS: I have a motion on the
10	floor, I have a second. Any discussion? Any
11	discussion? Being as there's no more discussion,
12	all in favor say aye.
13	(Chorus of ayes.)
14	All opposed? So be it.
15	The next one will be future planning,
16	Bruce Talbot. Shipmate?
17	RVPSC TALBOT: Before I start, how many
18	people read Tab L? Okay. I'm going to read it
19	to you pretty much with some revisions, and so if
20	you didn't read it, no need to look at it now.
21	Opening, I asked everybody to stop by and see us.

1	We had five people come in, which I thought was
2	really good, and they offered us some real input.
3	All of our meeting are open and all
4	visitors have privilege of the floor, we don't
5	shut any conversation down there. Our monthly
6	meetings are via Zoom, we try to keep to an hour,
7	so we do move along but everybody gets a voice.
8	The national committee on future
9	planning met in the Central Pacific A Room of the
10	Nugget Casino, Sparks, Nevada, Wednesday,
11	September 27 at 0900. Present were myself, Bruce
12	Talbot, Junior Past Regional President William
13	Hanzel, Regional President North Central Marcia
14	Cunningham, Junior Past Regional President
15	Southwest Roger Bacud, Regional Vice President
16	Southeast Carl Kurtly. Guests in attendance were
17	Past Regional President West Coast Charles
18	McIntire, Johnny Odom, Regional President South
19	Central Emmett Smith, and Jim Davis, our director
20	of legislative affairs. And I really appreciate
21	you guys coming and giving us some input. I wish

1	we would have had more input, and we are always
2	open for input. And also attending was the
3	national parliamentarian, Marty Posekany.
4	The committee's direction as stated in
5	Article 8, 819.C, the committee shall review all
6	aspects of the association, receive and review
7	suggestions submitted and make recommendations to
8	insure the association's growth and efficient
9	operation in the future.
10	Summary of progress on the projects
11	we're working:
12	Region realignment. North Central and
13	South Central regions agreed to realign and
14	become one region and will be ready to function
15	as one region following the 2024 national
16	convention. Official realignment will require
17	many bylaw revisions and will best be
18	incorporated into the 2025 constitutional
19	convention.
20	West Coast and Southwest regions are
21	discussing voluntary realignment, possibly

1	including the Northwest Region, and are currently
2	waiting on lessons learned from the North
3	Central-South Central merger or realignment.
4	Regions have been a longstanding
5	tradition within our organization, as regional
б	presidents comprise the majority of the national
7	board of directors. Modern communication has all
8	but eliminated the need for an RP to relay
9	communications, and an out-of-the-box solution
10	would be to abolish regions and fill the national
11	board of director positions by elected committee
12	chairmen. The closest chairman could be
13	dispatched to assist a troubled branch in an
14	emergency.
15	And again, we take all ideas and we
16	share them and we pick the ones that we act on.
17	Our action, future planning committee
18	will work with the C&BL committee and
19	parliamentarian to prepare for the bylaws changes
20	for the region realignment.
21	Future planning committee recommends the

1	FRA develop a strategic business plan to guide
2	the future of the organization. We had one in
3	about 2010 or so which, one of the outcomes was
4	establishing the future planning committee. We
5	don't track that; anybody seen our strategic
6	business plan recently? No? Okay. Action:
7	Recommend the NP appoint a committee to develop a
8	strategic business plan for the FRA.
9	The committee worked with the
10	parliamentarian to codify the security of assets
11	for voluntary or involuntary branch closure until
12	a majority of the branch members can decide asset
13	disposition. Our bylaws are very vague with
14	regard to this. Action: The future planning
15	committee recommends the national president with
16	the approval of the financial officer issue a
17	letter recommending how to control and disburse
18	these assets.
19	Realizing with current membership
20	trends, a qualified NED candidate may not exist
21	within our membership, the FPC or future planning

1	committee submitted a bylaws resolution that
2	would allow the board of directors to conduct a
3	search for a qualified NED candidate from within
4	the organization or external to the organization,
5	and in case of similarly qualified candidates,
6	the FRA member would be given preference.
7	Action: Future planning will modify and resubmit
8	the resolution ruled out of order and will
9	resubmit its companion resolution at the next
10	convention.
11	The committee welcomes input and ideas
12	on how to make our convention flow smoothly and
13	at a respectful pace, so members are not
14	scurrying from one meeting to another, or
15	simultaneously required to be in two locations at
16	once. Additionally, the convention dates should
17	be listed as the opening ceremony-installation
18	day with the information provided on the pre and
19	post board meetings and room reservation
20	information. For example, this convention would
21	have been listed as 26 to 29 September, vice 23rd

1	or whenever it was originally listed, so members
2	aren't initially shocked by how long the
3	convention is, because those of us that have to
4	be here for pre board and post board know we've
5	got to add those days on there. First timers
б	wouldn't realize that.
7	The future planning committee meeting
8	for this convention was conducted as an open door
9	session for members to drop by and share their
10	concerns and ideas. Monthly meetings are also
11	conducted as open sessions. Action: The future
12	planning committee recommends standing committees
13	meet regularly to conduct business throughout the
14	year. This would preclude having to do all the
15	committee's work at the meeting during the
16	national convention.
17	And expand Zoom access to committee
18	chairs so they could start their own meetings and
19	don't have to have a member of the FRA staff
20	start the meeting for them or bump them off if
21	there's a competing meeting. For example,

1	yesterday I had to be in three paces at once, or
2	I needed to be at the future planning committee
3	meeting, I wanted to be at the budget and finance
4	committee meeting because I think that's
5	important, and it ties in with the future
6	planning committee, and I wanted to be at the
7	constitution and bylaws committee because I had a
8	resolution that turned out to be ruled out of
9	order, and had I known that in advance, I could
10	have prepared an amendment to do on the floor and
11	we could have passed it this year. We chose not
12	to scurry through that because we have an
13	executive director now and next year will be
14	plenty of time to get it in there, so you will
15	see that resolution again.
16	Also, future planning committee will
17	coordinate with the centennial committee to
18	improve convention flow. Committee meetings are
19	organized throughout the week rather than all at
20	once, we won't hold meetings at the same time,
21	and will conduct workshops during convention

1	hours so members who would gain the most value
2	would attend.
3	And I go back to my friend Ralph Smith
4	who when I showed up at the first convention, he
5	said you've got a yellow hat, you're going to
6	that workshop and learn how to do this, and I
7	went to that workshop. So that was the way I was
8	taught and that's what we should be doing
9	tomorrow, our new people, to train them up on how
10	to do things.
11	Then when I became regional president he
12	told me, you've got a gray hat, you need to go
13	there and make sure they're doing things right.
14	Committee chairs forward recommended
15	changes to committee reports to the Past Regional
16	President Bill Hansel before the close of the
17	convention. So Bill has agreed to take on as
18	part of the future planning committee the changes
19	to those reports. So the committee chairs, if
20	you have a recommendation for a change to the
21	report, send it to Bill.

1	Committee chairs determine how much time
2	they need for convention meetings and forward to
3	Bill by close of convention. So while it's fresh
4	in your mind how long you took, send how long
5	that meeting should be to Bill so we can work
6	that in to the next convention as we start to
7	gear up towards it. And stakeholders should
8	forward input for branch officer report revisions
9	to Bill as well by the end of the year. We'd ask
10	you to do it by the convention but the branches
11	may have some input to that, so talk with them
12	and submit any recommendations for changes to
13	Bill, Bill has agreed to handle all that.
14	The constitutional convention is clearly
15	scheduled for 2025, and much preparation needs to
16	occur to insure its success. Action: The future
17	planning committee recommends standing up a
18	constitution convention committee focused on
19	bylaws revision to coordinate with the
20	constitution and bylaws committee now.
21	Ideas for members. And this is why it's

1	important that members come to our meetings or
2	submit their input and ideas, because we share it
3	in this forum. So special thanks to Johnny Odom
4	for the idea to place the QR codes on our banners
5	in a parade. It's on our membership application,
6	I never thought of putting it on the banner.
7	That way someone along the parade route could
8	scan the QR code rather than trying type in
9	www.fra.org, which isn't that hard, but it's a
10	lot easier to scan the QR code, and younger
11	people, that's their mode of operation, they're
12	used to it.
13	Our national board of directors midyear
14	must storm the Hill. If they don't, it's a
15	wasted trip to Washington D.C. And I add into
16	that from our John Davis' perspective, we must
17	storm the Hill every year, it's pretty much a
18	requirement. They miss us if we don't, they note
19	it, the note that we don't storm the Hill. So
20	our presence is not only requested but required
21	to be noticed.

1	Okay. Future yeah, those are ideas
2	for members. Future considerations. We
3	recommend and we're working on developing a
4	sponsorship revenue stream which is currently
5	being done by the national executive director,
б	and we will support as necessary. Branches
7	benefiting from the use of the FRA trademark, our
8	name, should be required to renew annually. This
9	would include items for sale by branches in club
10	rooms. Additionally, headquarters should turn
11	over the inventory and sale of all items to a
12	branch or branches.
13	Partnerships and coordination with other
14	veterans organizations and engaging our active
15	duty advisory council and reserve advisory
16	council. We got one letter from the master chief
17	petty officer of the Navy about our convention.
18	Consideration should be given to taking
19	the organization cloud based with the best
20	qualified employees working anywhere from home
21	with the exception of the NED and those whose

1	presence is required on Capitol Hill be in the
2	D.C. area, who could work from a small office
3	possibly shared with other veterans
4	organizations, and this is in progress with the
5	building committee.
б	Based on current trends, decommissioning
7	the FRA may become a reality. Current income
8	sources including proceeds from a sale of the
9	building are dismal, providing a budget forecast
10	for only a few years. Pending a miracle or an
11	alternative source of income, consideration
12	should be given to merging with other appropriate
13	organizations, and exiting with dignity, grace
14	and pride if necessary. Future planning
15	committee recommends preparing an exit plan and a
16	timeline in the case a proper decommissioning is
17	required, and it could take up to two to three
18	years.
19	I wish to express my thanks for the
20	opportunity to serve as chairman of the national
21	standing committee for future planning. This

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1 concludes my report and I move that it be 2 received. 3 Handzuk, delegate, 126, NVP HANDZUK: 4 second. 5 NP ROBBINS: I have a motion on the 6 floor and I have a second. 7 That was a very good report and I 8 appreciate that. And he did hit a point that 9 comes to heart. We all need to try harder, we 10 need to get out there and recruit. I know you're 11 tired of hearing that word recruit, but we need 12 members. I'm not throwing in the anchor yet. 13 I'm not going to let this ship go afloat. So, 14 I'll get off my soapbox. 15 Being that it's been seconded and 16 everything, is there any other discussion besides 17 mine? 18 NVP HANDZUK: Shipmate National 19 President. 20 NP ROBBINS: Shipmate NVP. 21 Handzuk, delegate, 126, NVP HANDZUK:

1	national vice president. I've been at many many
2	national conventions and I have to give Shipmate
3	Talbot an outstanding, a bravo zulu, a 5.0. This
4	is one of the most sober thinking and most blunt
5	realistic future planning reports I've ever seen
б	and heard. He deserved that applause from you
7	all.
8	I've been so impressed with him, and I'm
9	saying this even though you all are going to
10	latch, assuming I become your national president,
11	he has accepted chairmanship of that committee
12	for next year.
13	NP ROBBINS: Good. All right. Moving
14	on, our next thank you. Hey, I'm in a hurry.
15	All those in favor, say aye.
16	(Chorus of ayes.)
17	All those opposed?
18	Now, I get thinking about too many
19	things and going down the list.
20	Legislative service, Shipmate Davis.
21	Yes, you have to come up here.

1	And shipmates, I'm going to ask again,
2	when somebody is giving their reports, please do
3	not side bar.
4	S/M DAVIS: Good morning, shipmates.
5	The national committee on legislative service met
б	yesterday at 0730. Those in attendance received
7	a legislative briefing and they approved the
8	legislative agenda and the Pinnacle Award
9	recipients, and that's all in your kit and I ask
10	that that be approved.
11	NP ROBBINS: So, you move that it be
12	approved?
13	S/M DAVIS: Yes, and I wanted to talk to
14	them about what's going on on the Hill.
15	NP ROBBINS: Okay.
16	S/M DAVIS: Before we get to that, I
17	just wanted to let you know what's going on on
18	Capitol Hill. The House and Senate are unable to
19	come to an agreement regarding provisions of a
20	continuing resolution which would temporarily
21	keep the government open, so in all likelihood,

1	the government will shut down at midnight this
2	Saturday. Both chambers, the House and Senate
3	are both moving forward with continuing
4	resolutions, I guess that's the good news. The
5	bad news is the other chamber says we're not
6	going to act on it, it's unacceptable. So the
7	big differences are funding levels, Ukraine aid,
8	and also border security.
9	Back in the day, a continuing
10	resolution, basically all they did was keep the
11	government open at the current levels, spending
12	levels. And more and more as we do more of these
13	every year because they can't pass all the
14	appropriation bills on time, they've been adding
15	things to them, which is okay, but what now is
16	the situation where they don't agree on the
17	add-ons pretty much, so that's been a problem.
18	So as a result federal workers,
19	including active duty military, will not be paid
20	until the agreement is finalized. During past
21	government shutdowns, I think I told you last

1	time, legislation was passed to continue to pay
2	the Armed Forces, and there have been legislative
3	proposals just introduced yesterday in both the
4	House and the Senate, but you know how fast
5	Congress works, so it will be very very difficult
б	for those proposals to get passed on time and
7	get, basically what they do is say they would pay
8	the military while there's a shutdown, but I
9	think it very tough to see how those are going to
10	pass on time. So that's where we are, I just
11	wanted you to be aware of that.
12	Just some background information. We've
13	had 22 shutdowns since 1976. Ten of them were,
14	government employees didn't get paid on time.
15	And the longest shutdown was in 2018, that lasted
16	35 days. Everybody remember that one? So
17	anyway, I just wanted to give you that update.
18	Thank you.
19	NP ROBBINS: I have a motion on the
20	floor sorry, I've got to have somebody at the
21	mic.

1	PRPNC LICKTEIG: Shipmate Lickteig,
2	Branch 161. I second.
3	NP ROBBINS: I have a motion and I have
4	a second. Is there any discussion? Any
5	discussion? Being as there is no further
6	discussion, all in favor say aye.
7	(Chorus of ayes.)
8	All opposed? So be it.
9	Shipmates, I do need you to come to the
10	mic for recording purposes. That's why I'm
11	trying to be more gentle with the mic, because
12	the gentleman over there will blow his ear drums
13	out. Okay. Moving on.
14	Membership and retention, Shipmate John
15	Handzuk, VP.
16	NVP HANDZUK: Good morning, shipmates.
17	The national convention committee on membership
18	retention met in Southern Pacific C at 0900, 27
19	September, 0800. Those in attendance were
20	myself, chairman; Regional Vice President
21	Southeast Carl Kurtly, Branch 22; Regional Vice

1	President Southwest Ed Lebeau, Branch 302;
2	Regional Vice President Northeast/New England Ray
3	Rizzo, Branch 124; Regional Vice President East
4	Coast Robert Olivera, Branch 193; and Regional
5	Vice President Bruce Talbot, Branch 159. Our
6	advisor, Director of Membership and Development
7	Christina Hitchcock was also in attendance.
8	Visitors were Kurt Baker, Branch 14; Jerry
9	Miranda, Branch 70; Robert Porter, Branch 185;
10	First Vice President Cheryl Kloskey, Branch 59;
11	Regional President Northwest Rex Faubion, Branch
12	104; Past Regional President South Central C.
13	Ursula Gruetzner, Branch 201; Regional Vice
14	President West Coast Robert Huffman, Branch 197;
15	President Paul Rogers of Branch 179; and honorary
16	member Cynthia Banks, Branch 201.
17	I'm not going to go into the primary
18	duties, you all know what our job is, and we
19	tried very very hard to work on that. We did
20	meet monthly via Zoom, the meetings were open to
21	the membership. Shipmates in attendance were

1	asked to review the chairman's report as
2	submitted in your delegate kit in Section O,
3	which I went over earlier in the convention. And
4	you also saw the director of membership
5	development staff report in Section H. At the
б	end of the DMD's report you will find the fourth
7	quarter voting strengths, and the report
8	summarizes information not included in the
9	delegate kit and information that pertains to
10	national awards prepared by the committee.
11	We discussed throughout the year and
12	again yesterday initiative to engage younger
13	members and empower them to use social media and
14	to help identify younger members. And one of the
15	biggest things was the code thingy, QR code,
16	there you go. Hey, I was close. Hey, got to
17	have some humor here, but perhaps that will get
18	us some more engagement because that's what the
19	younger generation does, that's what they do, the
20	QR code, they don't like paper.
21	Many of the things we talked about in

1	the PR, parades, public engagement in the
2	community, getting our name out there and
3	everybody ran a gamut. More people need to try
4	that, more branches. The 23-24 marketing plan
5	was discussed. As noted, the application has
б	been revised for the centennial marketing
7	campaign, and updated to reflect that special
8	offer, which is \$64 for new members, it's 24 for
9	the first year, 40 for the second.
10	There were other offers but we could
11	only have one discount, if you will, in the
12	course of a year according to the constitution
13	and bylaws, and the one that actually came to me,
14	and that shipmate beat me up, he made a phone
15	call trying to convince me to give away,
16	literally give away membership, and I said we
17	can't afford to do it. He considered it an
18	investment. I said we're already operating at a
19	deficit and what guarantee statistically do we
20	have that we're going to get those folks to stay?
21	So as you noted, it was ruled out of order.

1	Anyway, moving on. One branch was
2	awarded the outstanding membership promotion for
3	the Abraham Rosenberg award and that went to
4	Wilmington, North Carolina Branch because their
5	overall recruiting gain was 76 percent.
6	Congratulations to them. That was Branch 299.
7	And as a point of information, they surrendered
8	their branch charter back in 2018, and all the
9	members went MAL. The former members reorganized
10	and requested reorganization, were granted a
11	charter on March 16th, 2022, and since that time
12	they have grown from 25 members as of March 31st,
13	2022, to 48 members as of August 31st of this
14	year.
15	Now, the Frank J. McPherson award,
16	that's one I didn't have information on in the
17	initial report the other day. The committee is
18	pleased to announce we had three total
19	nominations. The winner Shipmate Lawrence
20	Beirola, Branch 72, Fall River, Mass.
21	Larry has an enormous yet quiet impact

1	on a branch by leading a reinvigorating
2	generation of the shipmates. He is a tireless
3	advocate of the FRA, attends events and wherever
4	possible actively participates by staffing a
5	table or actively participating in the events.
6	Whether working with the FRA or external veterans
7	groups, he looks to find the best outcome for all
8	involved and truly exemplifies the core values of
9	the FRA, loyalty, protection and service.
10	He lives the FRA cardinal principles
11	through the buddy system. He's taken it on to
12	insure two of the shipmates attend all of their
13	medical appointments. He has also up daily
14	breakfast meetings at a local diner for shipmates
15	to drop in.
16	Shipmate Larry brings a considered and
17	thoughtful approach to leadership but equally a
18	willingness to learn. His honesty, friendliness
19	and considerate nature are qualities that make
20	him a natural leader. Larry has time for
21	everyone who comes to him. In the year since

1	Larry has assumed the position of branch vice
2	president, his affable nature, clear insight and
3	guiding vision has garnered the respect and
4	admiration of those shipmates, as well as the
5	other veterans organizations in Bristol County
6	Veterans Council. He tirelessly promotes the FRA
7	at every opportunity and during last year's
8	Veterans Day events he took it upon himself to
9	attend not just one, but all veterans events in
10	the Fall River area to promote the Fleet Reserve
11	Association and its program offerings.
12	He leads by example, doesn't shy away
13	from tough challenges, and has worked tirelessly
14	to both raise his and his fellow shipmates' level
15	of knowledge of the association. The committee
16	is honored to recognize Larry Beirola for the
17	Frank J. McPherson Memorial Award.
18	All right, spelling on Shipmate Larry's
19	last name, B-E-I-R-O-L-A. That's his last name,
20	first name Larry or Lawrence, Branch 72.
21	Having completed all other business, we

1	proceeded to review statistics for branch
2	membership awards. Again, they were promulgated
3	the other day. We opened the committee to a
4	roundtable discussion of what to do to try to
5	reinvigorate recruiting and retention. We
6	discussed the resolutions that were submitted,
7	that's finished business. The gold banners for a
8	hundred percent were passed out to the RPs, and
9	we opened it up also to the visitors.
10	If you recall earlier this year, the
11	committee will back me up on this because I kind
12	of harp on it at every meeting, I like to use the
13	word sponsor vice recruit, because when you go to
14	a military installation and say you want to
15	recruit members, they lock the door and throw the
16	key away. What you're trying to do is pass out
17	information, and have applications.
18	It goes back to the old days when we
19	were in the military. You got PCS orders. In
20	short order you got greetings from your
21	prospective new command and were assigned a

1	sponsor to help that transition. Well, that's
2	what you're doing when you're recruiting, and
3	once you recruit that member and they get on the
4	rolls and they got their card, it's not finished
5	business, shipmates. Part of your job is to
6	continue or begin the process of mentoring.
7	They're our reliefs, and I'm not going to stand
8	here and give you examples for how I mentored my
9	subordinates in the Navy.
10	What I can say to you, and I'm not going
11	to use their names, I've been in the organization
12	a little over 40 years. I rejoined in 1983 when
13	I was pushing boots through Orlando. There were
14	three shipmates in that branch that mentored me,
15	and they were brother shipmates, and the biggest
16	thing they drove home to me, do what's best for
17	the organization, loyalty, protection and
18	service, and that's what I've tried to do thus
19	far.
20	So I challenge you, don't forget that
21	new member, engage them, bring them to the

1	meeting, a shipmate comes to you with a question
2	about why do you do this or why do you do that,
3	explain the purpose behind it, get them educated.
4	They will be more willing to become engaged.
5	Shipmate National President, that
6	concludes my report. I move that it be accepted.
7	SPEAKER: (Inaudible) delegate
8	(inaudible) second.
9	NP ROBBINS: I didn't hear you. I have
10	a motion on the floor and I have a second. Is
11	there any discussion? Any discussion? Being as
12	there is no further discussion, all in favor say
13	aye.
14	(Chorus of ayes.)
15	All opposed? So be it.
16	Moving down the road, public relations.
17	Shipmate Robert Beeme. Come on, somebody help
18	him up. Shipmate Bob is a good shipmate.
19	S/M BEEME: I am shipmate Robert Beeme,
20	Branch 32, Lake of the Ozarks. The national
21	convention committee on public relations met in

1	the Pacific Conference Room D of the Nugget Hotel
2	and Casino at 0900 hours on Wednesday,
3	September 27th, 2023. In attendance were myself;
4	Joyce Harris, Branch 20; Pete Lazzaretti, Branch
5	18; Lou Transfiguracion, Branch 302; and Ed
б	Blein, Branch 17.
7	Items for action. The committee would
8	like to remind shipmates that with the midterm
9	elections, that as a nonpartisan organization,
10	members and branches cannot endorse any one
11	political candidate, party or initiative on
12	either the local or national ballots while
13	exhibiting the FRA logo. This includes posts on
14	any social media platform.
15	The national committee on public
16	relations' primary duty is to promulgate to the
17	membership methods of development and fostering
18	good public relations for the Fleet Reserve
19	Association and to assist branches in
20	establishing well organized public relation
21	programs consistent with the aims and principles

1	of the preamble of the C&BL. The committee
2	recognizes FRA branches annually for their
3	activities and programs.

13	to say? I knew you couldn't turn down the
14	chance. Do you want to come up here or do it
15	there? Everybody else does it up here.

17	tickets that haven't been picked up yet for
18	Manicella Sanchez. No, no takers? Nancy
19	Osemple. And Diane Mendoza. Are they all from
20	your all right. That takes care of that.
