To the National Executive Director of the Fleet Reserve Association: I write to offer greetings to all Fleet Reserve Association members attending the association's 93rd National Convention this October 5 through 8, 2021 in Spokane Valley, Washington. The enlisted personnel of America's sea services, the U.S. Navy, U.S. Marine Corps and U.S. Coast Guard make crucial contributions to the nation's security during wartime and peacetime, and I and my colleagues in Congress are grateful for your service and sacrifice.

As chair of the House Armed Services
Subcommittee on Military Personnel, I am
especially aware of the impact that the high
tempo has on service members and military
families, especially during the COVID-19
pandemic, which has created additional hardships.
I am concerned that the combination of high OPT,
MTO and undermanning on ships poses unacceptable
risks to our service members, and I offered NDAA
provisions to address undermanning on ships and
service member fatigue across all military
services.

Further, I have been working for more than a decade to address and discourage sexual harassment and sexual harassment in the military. We must establish a culture within the military where no forms of sexual violence are tolerated and perpetrators are held accountable. The House version of the NDAA includes groundbreaking provisions to move persecution decisions in special victim offenses from commanders to

specialized military prosecutors. 1 This reform 2 among others that I have offered are essential 3 steps to protect service members from those who 4 would violate them. Quality of life benefits are not just to have, nice to have, those are 5 6 essential to attracting and retaining service 7 members who make our military the greatest in the 8 world. 9 That's why I am also working to expand 10 parental leave, increase access to childcare and improve health care for service members and military families. S/M DAVIS: Good afternoon, shipmates, can you hear me? All right.

I'm here to provide you with the legislative update of what's going on. First of all I want to talk about our legislative team, first of all I'd like to welcome also and tell you we have a government affairs committee, I call it, it's the National Committee on Legislative Service and they meet twice a year and they develop, they help us stay on course with FRA policy. The committee consists of Chris Slawinski and also Past Regional President Southeast Frederic Bowles from Branch 269, Past Regional President Northwest Tom Brannick from Branch 382, Past Regional President Northeast/New

England James Brown from Branch 226, Past 2 Regional President North Central Barry White from 3 Branch 161, and Past Regional President West 4 Coast William Matthews from Branch 187, and 5 finally, Past Regional President Southwest Bruce 6 Davis from Branch 70. That's your legislative 7 team and they work with us to put together the 8 legislative agenda and give us their advice. 9 The legislative team consists of myself, 10 John Davis, Chris Slawinski, Assistant Director 11 of Legislative Programs Theo Lawson, and 12 Assistant Director of Veterans Programs Noel 13 Huffer. 14 We've been very much involved over the 15 years since 1985 with the military coalition, 16 which is a group of about 35 organizations that 17 primarily have the same agenda and we work

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don't know if you remember that, they wanted to

created as a result of the Gramm-Rudman Bill, I

together, we share information to get things

done. That's been around since 1985, that was

cap spending, and everyone thought that it would cut a lot of military benefits as a result of that change. Okay, next slide.

So Chris Slawinski, as you know, he's cochair of the Military Coalition Guard and Reserve and Veterans Committee. He also does veteran issues, he's also by the way an NVSO and he deals with reserve issues. When I say veteran issues I'm talking about toxic exposure, that's a really big item on Capitol Hill right now.

There's a bill in both houses, in fact both bills

have gotten out of their committees of origin and they're apparently very expensive and so there's been a delay in moving them forward.

Also when I talk about veteran issues
I'm talking about homelessness, which is still a
problem; suicide, which depending on who you talk
to may be a little better; and also we deal with
the cost of spending of the Department of
Veterans Affairs which includes its budget. And
the Biden administration's first budget for the

1 VA actually increased it by ten percent, which is 2 a very very healthy increase. And by the way, 3 the Build Back Better Act which is that \$3.5 4 trillion mega spending bill, we've been watching 5 it and for a long time it didn't have anything we 6 cared about, but one of its latest versions 7 includes 18 billion more dollars for the 8 Department of Veterans Affairs, most of it goes 9 for infrastructure, so building new buildings. Ι don't know if a lot of you've been in a lot of 10 11 these VAs but a lot of them look pretty, at least the ones I've been in look pretty dilapidated, 12 13 pretty old, like they were built in the '50s or 14 the '40s, and so the veterans committee in both 15 the House and the Senate are starting to look at 16 we've got to replace these buildings and make 17 them new infrastructure, so that's going to be a 18 big issue. Chris also deals with reserve 19 component issues. 20 I myself, I'm cochair of the TMC Retiree 21 Policy Committee, which I think everyone's

1 interested in, retirement policy, and I kind of 2 really cover the waterfront as director of 3 legislative programs and I deal with the spending 4 bills which, we really haven't gotten any 5 spending bills passed, and appropriations bills, 6 so we had to pass a continuing resolution which 7 flat lines spending, they had to pass it by 8 October 1 and they did, and it lasts until 9 December 3rd, okay? 10 We're also of course monitoring the 11 National Defense Authorization Act, the House has 12 passed their version of the bill, the senate 13 committee has approved its version and it's sitting out on the senate floor waiting for that 14 15 Both bills have issues we to be acted upon. 16 really care about such as pay, both bills provide 17 inadequate pay increases, which our keynote 18 speaker was talking about this morning, the 19 employment cost index, which is a 2.7 percent 20 increase for active duty. Both bills have what

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they call a basic allowance, a basic needs

allowance they call it, which is for people that are junior enlisted and have kids, they're actually under the poverty level with their pay, they give them a little more pay, and that's in both bills.

No Tricare fee increases in either bill at this point, so -- in the bills.

Also, the senate bill has not been acted upon, right, the senate still has to act on it, and we're working on some amendments. We've got a commitment from Senator Tester from Montana, that he will file an amendment for concurrent receipt for the Senate and VA bill. And also our bill, our final month's pay bill that I've talked to you about before, that also is going to be filed as an amendment.

So -- and we're also hoping for another amendment, I haven't confirmed this yet but we want -- right now in law, if you're a retiree and you get out of the military, you can't work at the Pentagon as a civilian for 180 days, you have

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to wait 180 days, and we're working on this, so there may be an amendment on that as well for that Senate NDAA, okay?

Obviously I deal a lot with concurrent receipts as head of the retiree committee and I will talk about that a little bit more. We're working on Tricare fee increases. I'm also on the TMC health care committee and we've been working on that. We deal with, I deal with active duty issues as well. What does that mean? Pay and BAH and housing, basically that's what that comes down to, and we've been working on those issues. I do, I put the stuff, the issues on the action center, I write the news bites and I write the testimony, just so you know, and so that keeps the association going in government affairs. Next one.

Theo Lawson is also our assistant director of legislative programs and he's involved with the TMC, he's on the veterans committee and the personnel committee which does

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active duty issues. He's also involved with veterans toxic exposure, and FRA is involved with a coalition called TEAM which is the Toxic Exposure of the American Military coalition, and we're working trying to get a big comprehensive toxic exposure bill.

As you guys remember, we passed the Agent Orange Blue Water Navy bill. That just dealt with sailors, that just dealt with the sailors during the Vietnam War. This one's going to cover everybody, anybody, to that will cover like burn pits, people in Iraq and all that, including my son who was in Afghanistan, I was talking to him and I was saying were you around any burn pits, and he was like yeah, all the time, you know. It's really amazing, you know, if you talk to some Marines in these bases in this day and age, that they said you'd walk into base and it would be like a fog over the base, and they'd say what's causing the fog, and they'd go oh, they're burning stuff, toxic stuff outside

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the gate, and they didn't even realize, gee, that these people are breathing that stuff in, it's really amazing in this day and age.

But anyway, so he's involved with that and as I said, personnel issues. He's a VSO and he's also involved in our veterans service foundation and our FRA's veterans committee.

And of course, Noel, I'll just do it, she's here if, I hope everybody's met her. She's the assistant director of veterans programs and she's also on the TMC veterans committee and the survivors committee. She's been very involved with the VA Cares Giver program. There was a VA Cares Giver program started back after 9/11, which basically took care of people that were catastrophically injured after 9/11, and we thought that's a great program but why just after 9/11. We have a bunch of Vietnam veterans and other people walking around that are seriously injured and their spouses or their uncle, their brother or sister are taking care of them and

they need help too. And this program is a really 1 nice program, the person who takes care of them, 3 they train them, they pay them, and it's a very good program. The problem was, we just wanted to 5 take out, you know, anybody that was injured after 9/11, just anybody that was injured. They 7 didn't want to do it that way, they have three separate programs now, one for people before 8 9 1975, for people between '75 and 9/11, and then for people after 9/11, the old program. Why they 10 did it that way, I'm not really sure, but we have 11 12 three separate programs with three slightly 13 different benefits, and to me it's a mess, it's a 14 mess. So we're working on that, though, and we're trying to get that implemented, and that's 15 16 an important bill. 17 We work very closely with the Elizabeth Dole Foundation, she's been very active in 18 19 helping us with that as well. 20 We also deal with survivor issues and

I'll get into some of that later on. Noel is

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also a VSO, she's also involved with the Veterans
Service Foundation and she's involved with the
FRA's veterans committee.

I just want to tell you, so it's now down to testimony, we didn't think we were going to have many opportunities to testify due to the pandemic, there was a lot of restrictions, it was very difficult to lobby when you can't go over to Capitol Hill, but we tried to do the best we can. Our National President Mick Fulton testified on March 18th, did a really good job representing us, it was on a Zoom meeting, he didn't actually go over to the Capitol, he was on a Zoom, but he did a really good job.

We've also put testimony in to the
Senate Armed Services Committee personnel
subcommittee on the Defense Authorization and
also the Senate Veterans Affairs Committee on
toxic exposure, we put a statement on that, and
we also sent a letter to the chairman and the
ranking member of the House Appropriations

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Committee on defense, on the defense budget, so three of the four of those are statements, we didn't get to actually testify, but we're hoping to keep our name in front of the committee staff so when they do start allowing testimony again we'll be invited back, okay, that's the plan.

One of the big issues of course for us is health care -- can you switch, Noel? And first I would like to ask, how many people here are on Tricare Select? Anybody, one, okay, a few, okay. I just wondered because you know, they just recently passed the Tricare fee increase for them, it's \$12.50 a month, and somebody ran out and actually, Senator Tester from Montana put a bill in to repeal that, those increases. That's not the way we wanted it to go, if we were going to cut something we would have loved to have a bill that would cut the future pharmacy co-pay increases that are going to keep going on until 2027, so every two years you're going to get an increase, and that's based

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on the FY 2017 Defense Authorization bill. But anyway, that got put in and we're supporting it but it hasn't gotten a lot of interest.

The other thing that we're very concerned about are drastic cuts to the medical staff that they propose, so not only do they want you to pay more, they want to cut your services, so we've been opposing that. They wanted to cut 18,000 originally, they delayed it for over a year now, and the House Defense Authorization bill that passed, that actually has a provision that makes them wait another before they can make any cuts. Since then by the way, the Defense Health Agency, the people who run Tricare, have come out and said well, maybe we don't need 18,000, maybe we can just get by with 12,000 cut, so they're getting the message that Congress isn't really keen on him cutting huge numbers of staff.

I mentioned in here too the CSIS, that's the Center for Strategic and International

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Studies, that's a think tank, it's sort of a left of center Washington think tank that recently put out a study which says military people are getting paid way too much money, retirees have too many benefits, especially health care, and if we're going to get this budget under control we've got to start looking at those things. So all I can tell you is this, this and other organizations are tied in with Capitol Hill politicians, and if they're putting out something like that because they're thinking along those lines themselves, so this is sort of a warning that at some point I think Congress is going to say you know, we've got to really look at cutting all these costs and we're going to need to, you know, keep the pressure up on these grassroots programs. We really believe, you know, I'm sure you know that we think health care benefits should reflect the extraordinary sacrifice of 20 years of service that military people have put in.

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there it's like apples to oranges. Because they'll come to us and they'll say, you know, civilians are getting killed with health care costs, health care costs are going up like crazy in the civilian world and you guys, you know, you guys have got to let it go up too, and we say no, it's an apples to oranges comparison. That's part of your pay for serving 20 years of arduous military service, and that that should be -- in fact a lot of you, myself when I was in the Marines, were told you stay in 20 years, you get free health care, does everybody remember that? (Chorus of yes from the audience.) Yeah, free health care if you stay in 20 years, and of course that didn't happen. And by the way that did go to court, that actually went to court, it actually was in a couple pamphlets that said that, and the Court ruled that a pamphlet is not a contract and when you sign a

I tried to explain to legislators up

contract it's the fine print there that counts,

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not the pamphlet. So anyway, we're strongly comitted to trying to make sure that the health care that you have continues because we think you've earned it.

The other issue, this is a big issue, concurrent receipts. There's a bunch of bills in HR 303, and it's 1147, they deal with people that are noncombat related injuries less than 50 Those have been in, those are percent. perennials. Also HR 333, easy to remember, that's one we like, if we could pass that we'd be done, because that does, covers everybody, everybody would get concurrent receipts. And then the other one is the Major Richard Starr Act which is just for those over those that are 61, served less than 20 years that were injured and retired and were combat related, that is in the combat zone, they were hurt in combat, they will get concurrent receipts. That's where we kind of made our stand because it costs less than a lot of the others, we're working on cosponsors, we

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have 122 House cosponsors and 51 Senate sponsors, and we're, the action of course is with amendments, and there was a House amendment filed by our sponsor and it did not get called when the House passed the NDAA. The Senate bill is coming up and we've got a commitment from Senator Tester that, the sponsor of the Senate bill, that he will put an amendment in, and we're hoping that that gets taken care of. We just think it's unjust to reduce retired pay because someone got disabled, that's really what this is comes down to, so we're working very hard to make sure that that gets done and you're, you may not know it but when you participate in the action center does make a difference and people, even if you don't get anything back from your congressman or your senator, they're still counting, they're counting those emails, and if they get a lot of emails it makes them concerned, okay? So keep up the effort there, that's important.

Last but not least, there's the Military

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Retiree Survivor Comfort Act that we used to call final month's pay, and this bill has been in since 2006 by a Republican from North Carolina named Walter Jones. And he passed away and all the other legislators had to pick up his bills and John Garamendi, a Democrat from California, picked up the bill. He's a great guy, I like him a lot, he's kind of a no nonsense guy, doesn't try and play politics, and he's our sponsor now. He's very pragmatic and so one of the things he did which, he changed it to where, we had it worded they would just get the final month's pay and that didn't work, and so the original sponsor said we'll delay the SBP payment for a month and that didn't move the needle at all, but what he's done, he said we're going to ask them to pay it back over 12 months. And at least that gets away with the chronic problem of having, you know, widow lose their husband and then DFAS comes in and just yanks the whole check right out of the checking account. What we want to do is for her

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to keep that and then if they have to they can pay it back over 12 months, it won't be the sticker shock of having it yanked out of their checking account, so we're going to try to do it that way and see if it goes somewhere. very encouraged, though, first time since we've had this bill in since 2006, we have a Senate bill, Senate Portman from Ohio graciously put the bill in. And he is also, by the way, going to put an amendment in for the current NDAA, so we're excited about that. Again, we really need to get cosponsors on that and we hope it does have a shot of going through. It's not when, since the widow is paying it back over 12 months, it should not be a huge cost to the treasury, so we're hoping the Senate will say we'll let it go by, so we'll see. I know I went over these issues rather

quickly, but I'd be glad if I have time to take some questions.

NP FULTON: Sure, go ahead.

1 ADVP HUFFER: Good afternoon, shipmates. 2 I just wanted to add, if anybody would like to 3 become a VSO, they can come talk to me to get 4 accredited. It's free if you're an FRA member, 5 so we need more VSOs. Also, if you're here at 6 1700, please come next door for the women 7 veterans forum and if you guys have any 8 questions, please let us know. Thank you. 9 S/M DAVIS: Yeah, in the back? 10 RPNENE ZINO: Delegate Zino, Branch 23. 11

RPNENE ZINO: Delegate Zino, Branch 23. Shipmate, just a question on SBP. I understand we've got a bunch of reservists or some reservists here in the audience and it's my -- I'm not a reservist but I'm understanding we've got a problem with SBP for reservists. It takes 30 years to get it paid in full and they're not even eligible for it until they turn age 60 if I'm correct. So a lot of reservists have been coming up me saying hey, is there something we can do about that, and I think that might be a good issue for the FRA to tackle.

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S/M DAVIS: Well, we talked about, that's been talked about four years ago. You know, it's one thing to give somebody who served, you know, a bunch of years active duty day in day out, 12 months a year, working in the military, and then they get injured and you give them SBP. It's another thing for a reservist who does one weekend a month, two weeks a year. Now of course we have a strategic reserve which means if you sign up for six years the last year you're going to be on active duty, but that's still not the same commitment to be on active duty. We're certainly willing to look at something to improve their benefits, but I don't know if they should get the exact same thing as an active duty person. RPNENE ZINO: Maybe some kind of --S/M DAVIS: Yeah, I think it needs to be looked at, definitely. RPNENE ZINO: Thank you, Shipmate. Thank you, Shipmate National President.

1 S/M DAVIS: Any other questions? Okay. 2 Well, I'm around all week so if you think of 3 something. Oh yeah, where? 4 RPSC: Gruetzner, Delegate, Branch 201, 5 Regional President South Central. Question: The 6 medical personnel that we have were reservists 7 and military at our VAs. Are they talking about 8 going contract civilians and will we have the 9 problem that we had back in the '90s where the 10 union for the civilian medical personnel where 11 they say he, we're going to stop you, and pulled them out? We're not going to run into that 12 13 again, are we? 14 Well, we went with the, I'm S/M DAVIS: 15 trying to think what the name of the program is, 16 you know, where they said if you got on a waiting 17 list, remember the waiting list thing at the VA, 18 people were on waiting lists to get on waiting 19 lists and all that kind of stuff, and then they 20 allowed them -- I'm trying to think of the name 21 of the program. They let them go to, it was the

1 Mission Act, and they let them go to private 2 sector people they contracted out. 30 percent of 3 all veterans are now going to private sector 4 people, and from what I hearing, I don't hear a 5 lot of complaints, unless you know something 6 different. I haven't heard a lot of complaints. 7 Most people are really happy, you know, at least 8 within 30 days they're seeing somebody, that's the main thing, right, if you're really sick you 9 10 want to get to somebody pretty quick, you don't want to be on a waiting list, so that seems to be 11 12 working pretty well. 13 RPSC GRUETZNER: I'm talking about VA 14 employees. 15 S/M DAVIS: VA employees being 16 unionized, you mean? 17 RPSC GRUETZNER: Yes. 18 S/M DAVIS: And that's a problem? Yes, 19 unions can be a problem, so we're going to get 20 into the labor issues too? No, they are a 21 problem, but I don't know how to, you know,

1 that's, it's a fact of life, yeah. 2 Are there any other questions? Again, 3 I'm around and if you need me, you know, let me 4 know. Thanks. 5 (Applause.) 6 NP FULTON: Okay, shipmates, it is 1445 7 and the only thing that I am going to finalize before we close for the day is to insure standing 8 9 committee assignments for tomorrow when the 10 committee members will get together. 11 Shipmate Past Regional President Norm 12 Combs is present. Are you ready to get your 13 committee together in the morning? 14 I'm ready, I don't know PRPNC COMBS: 15 about the committee. 16 NP FULTON: But you know who's on the 17 committee and if they're here, they're here, if 18 they're not then feel free to sit in on when we identify where everybody is going to go in the 19 20 morning. 21 PRPNC: Shipmate President, Combs,
