PRESIDENT: (Taps gavel once for assembly attention.) This assembly will now come to order. Shipmate Master-At-Arms, you will invite the shipmates to enter the convention hall and close the doors.

MASTER-AT-ARMS: Shipmate National President, the doors are locked -- closed. We will have a few stragglers, as usual.

4 Business Session of the 92nd Convention of the
5 Fleet Reserve Association regularly convened.

6 (Taps gavel once to seat assembly.)

9 Reporter, who is to the right of the rostrum is
10 Ms. Cindy Swords from Alpha.

11

12 PRESIDENT: I want to remind all the delegates
13 that when addressing the chair on any matter,
14 including the seconding of motions, you must
15 speak into the microphone, and you must state
16 your last name, branch number. The recording of
17 this convention is by electronic means. If you
18 do not speak into the microphone, your name,

1 PRESIDENT: The 1st Credential Report isn't
2 ready, so we'll continue on. Shipmates, we will
3 now have the presentation of the Annual Reports

5 Sections 612(a), C&BL, FRA, all recommendations

24 approve something when you have no idea what you
25 are approving?

2 NED: Shipmates, that statement is incorrect.

3 That NBR -- is an answer to my request, as the

4 parliamentarian, to write a resolution to amend

5 that section, and you're not amending anything.

6 It's just that it was a resolution for me to

7 write a resolution, and you'll see that later in

8 the NBR.

9

10 UNIDENTIFIED DELEGATE: Okay. But it should be

11 -- Shipmate, that should be so stated.

12

13 UNIDENTIFIED DELEGATE: I agree, and I said that.

14 It was misstated

20 authorize expenditure of an additional \$2,000 for
21 the Welfare and Rehabilitation Reserve, for a

17

18 PRESIDENT: Okay. Shipmate Snee, do you want to
19 talk about the veterans?

20

21 DELEGATE SLAWINSKI: Shipmate National President.

22

23 PRESIDENT: Shipmate at mike.

24

25 DELEGATE SLAWINSKI: Slawinski, National Service

1 Director, headquarters. Shipmates, we've had
2 some individuals that are here from the
3 Department of Veterans Affairs. One is from the
4 Vet Center that's here locally in Memphis.
5 Tomorrow, starting at 8:30, 9 o'clock, they will
6 have their mobile Vet Center here. It will be
7 located on the back entrance. For those who have
8 gone out towards the section of buses where the
9 buses come in and out, where you go and catch the

7 assembly to stand and receive the Ladies.)

8 UNIDENTIFIED SHIPMATE: Among the Junior Past
9 National President. That's my husband over there
10 acting crazy. Anyway, my running mate -- I was
11 National President '17 to '18. My running mate
12 was Bill Starkey, and after the joke I told at
13 regional I'm not allowed to tell anymore. So I
14 hope you have a great convention. Our next in
15 line is -- what's your name? -- Helen Courneya,
16 and she was a good person to Bob.

17
18 LA PNP COURNEYA: Everyone seems to be picking on
19 short people at his convention. That's not nice.
20 You know? But anyway, I'm Helen Courneya. If
21 you don't know by now, I was Past National
22 President three times over. My first running
23 mate was Jim Scarbrough. God bless him. He's
24 gone to Supreme Commander. Was 2010, 2011.
25 2015, 2016 I served with Virgil Courneya.

1 UNIDENTIFIED DELEGATES: Who?

2

3 LA PNP COURNEYA: Virgil Courneya, Past National
4 President. And then, my third term, I was with
5 Don Larsen, and we looked like Mutt and Jeff so I
6 don't want to hear nothing about it. Okay? He's
7 just a little taller than me. But anyway, I hope
8 you all are having a great convention. Thank
9 you.

11 LA PNP RODHAM-TUCK: In case you want to know who
12 I am, I am Cindy Rodham-Tuck, National President
13 2009/'10 with Gary Blackburn. And I have a lot
14 of problems with people who are always picking
15 about me about my accent. So I have a very quick
16 story to tell you. I used to work at the
17 registry in motor vehicles in Rhode Island, and I
18 had a phone call one day from a woman, and I was
19 really -- it was the end of the day. It was
20 Friday. It was a holiday weekend, and we wanted
21 to get out of there. I needed to call the main
22 office to ask a question, and they all turn the
23 phones off at 3:30, and we had the same phone
24 number as everybody else.

25

Anyway, the woman called. She wanted to

1 know how to get a Rhode Island driver's license,
2 how to get -- register her car, how to register
3 their boat, et cetera, et cetera. So my way of
4 answering questions is I ask you questions. So I
5 said, what year is your car? Who owns it? Is it
6 leased? Da, da, da, da, da. And then I said,
7 okay, you do this, this, and this, and this. You
8 come into the registry of motor vehicles. In the
9 back of the office, there's a long blue and white
10 form. You fill it out, Part A, Part B, Part C,
11 Part D, Part F, and then you wait in line. So I
12 said, did you get all that? And she said, I
13 don't think so. And I said, well, what part
14 didn't you get? And she said, well, that's it;
15 what's a part? Thank you. And I hope you all
16 have a great convention.

17
18 LA PNP MARTIN: Linda Martin, Past National
19 President, 2002/2003. My running mate was Ralph
20 Schmidt, also known as Walking Eagle. I want to
21 thank you -- take this time to thank you for all
22 your cards, letters, concerns when my husband,
23 my hero, Past Regional President, Terry Martin,
24 died in May. It meant a lot to me and our
25 family. I'm wishing you a productive convention.

1 Thank you.

2

3 LA PNP BOUDREAUX: Hello. I'm Pat Boudreaux. I
4 was -- no it's not Patricia. It's never been
5 Patricia. We don't answer to Patricia. Patricia
6 is out of the room. Anyway back to -- I was
7 National President in 2005 through 2006, of
8 course, and my running mate was Big Ed's Deer.
9 You can't get any bigger than that. And
10 regional, I was 1996, '97, and Larry was my
11 running mate. I wish y'all the very best on your
12 convention. Thank you.

13

14 LA PNP ROBBINS: Good afternoon, Shipmates. I'm
15 Sandra Robbins. I was National President 2006,
16 2007, following her, and we had a great time. My
17 running mate was Jerry Sweeney, and I just
18 visited him prior to him moving into his new
19 place, him and Sandy, and they are doing well.
20 I'm sure they would appreciate some cards and
21 stuff from y'all. They do miss coming to
22 conventions and everything.

23 I have a little funny, and it's called
24 the Navy Chaplain versus the Pilot. A Navy
25 Chaplain dies and is waiting in line at the

1 Pearly Gates. Ahead of him is a guy who is
2 dressed in sunglasses, a loud shirt, leather
3 jacket and jeans. Saint Peter addresses this
4 cool guy: Who are you and so that I may know
5 whether or not to admit you to the Kingdom of
6 Heaven? The guy replies: I'm Jack. I'm a
7 retired Navy pilot and Southwest Airline pilot
8 from Jacksonville, Florida. Saint Peter consults
9 his list. He smiles and says to take pilot:
10 Take this silken robe and golden staff, and enter
11 in the kingdom. The pilot goes into heaven with
12 his robe and staff.

13 Next is the Navy Chaplain's turn. He
14 stands erect and booms out: I'm Chaplain Bob,
15 chaplain with the Navy for the last 30 years.
16 Saint Peter consults his list. He says to the
17 Navy Chaplain: Take this cotton robe and wooden
18 staff, and enter into the kingdom. Just a
19 minute, says the Navy Chaplain. That man was a
20 pilot and he's gets a silken and golden staff,
21 and I only get a cotton and wood. How can this
22 be? Up there we go by results -- up here we go
23 by results, says Saint Peter. When you preached,
24 people slept. When he flew, people prayed. Have
25 a great day.

1
2
3 LA PNP BALDWIN: Good afternoon my name is
4 Jennifer Gail Baldwin. But I feel exactly like
5 Pat does. Jennifer is out of the room. I have a
6 really funny, and related to my name. I've been
7 seeing the same doctor for the last 20 years. My
8 official records say "Jennifer". She calls me
9 "Jen". I've never corrected her. I was giving
10 her a note to call Express Scripts, and I just
11 wrote on the top so she would remember, and I
12 just commonly said, "Gail". So she looks at the
13 note and she says, who's Gail? And I said,
14 that's me. And she said, you have allowed me to
15 call you Jen for 20 years. She's a great doctor.

16 At any rate, I was National President
17 2007, 2008. My running mate was Mr. Larry
18 Boudreaux. I wish you all a very successful
19 convention. And come to the southwest next year
20 in August because I'm going to promote -- we're
21 doing the southwest regional convention in
22 fabulous Las Vegas next August.

23
24 LA PNP LARSON: Howdy, y'all. I'm Gini Larson.
25 I was National President 2011, 2012 with Driscoll

1 Martin. I was Regional President of the South
2 Central 2008, 2009, and my running mate was
3 Donald. I am the current Regional President of
4 the South Central this year and the Regional
5 President Elect, and my partner was Emmett Smith.
6 Have a great convention.

7 LA PNP KRUGER: Howdy, y'all. I'm Diane Kruger,
8 Past National President. Served 2012, 2013 with
9 Mark Kilgore, the fabulous Mark that knows
10 everybody. I'll do a little bragging. Donald
11 and I just became great grandparents to a little
12 granddaughter Monday morning, 8 pounds, Olivia.

13 Okay. Here's a little joke. This guy
14 calls and says: Hello. This is the Sheriff's
15 office. Yes. What can I do for you? I'm
16 calling to report about my neighbor, Virgil
17 Smith. He's hiding marijuana inside his wood --
18 firewood. Don't quite know how to get you inside
19 those logs, but he's hidden it there. Thank you
20 very much for your call, sir. Next day the
21 sheriff's deputies descend on Virgil's house.
22 They search the shed where the firewood is kept
23 using axes. They busted open every piece of
24 wood. They found no marijuana. They sneered at
25 Virgil and left. Shortly after they left, the

1 phone rings at Virgil's house. Hey, Virgil, this
2 is Floyd. Did those sheriffs come by? Yeah.

3
4 Did they chop your firewood? Yeah. Happy
5
6 Birthday, Bud.

7 LA PNP WHITAKER: My name is Carolyn Whitaker. I
8 was National President 2013, 2014. My running
9 partner was Virgil Courneya, my Nevada husband.
10 Y'all will have to hear that story some time.
11 I'm not going to tell a joke because I always
12 forget the punch line, but you all have a great
13 convention.

14
15 LA PNP FRI: Good afternoon. Shipmates, I'm
16 Doris Fri, National President 2014, 2015. I
17 served with that crazy guy that lives in Hawaii,
18 John Eipert, who tells one more joke on me, I'm
19 going to kick him. In case nobody noticed my
20 shirt, I bought that just for John. It said, I
21 may live in Kansas but my story started in
22 Kentucky. I am not from Kansas. I live in
23 Kansas. Have a productive and harmonious
24 convention, and we'll see you tonight at the
25 Welcome Board.

1 LA PNP ADELIN: I'm Ruth Adeline. I was
2 National President '94, '95. My running mate was
3 George Hyland. We got along really well because
4 we both spoke the same English. And, Cindy, I
5 can understand with Pat they didn't understand.

6 LA PNP HOLLYBROOK: Hello, Shipmates. My name is
7 Doreen Hollybrook, and I served 1990, '91 with
8 Shipmate Dale Combs. We had a great year, and he
9 really misses being here with you, but you
10 probably don't miss him so much, but that's okay.

11 Okay. Instead of a joke, I do have a
12 little story to tell you. On December 7th, 1941,
13 29-year-old machinist Mate, First Class Eugene
14 Everhart, from Newark, New Jersey, who was
15 assigned to the battleship USS Oklahoma, which
16 was stationed at Pearl Harbor when the ship was
17 attacked by Japanese aircraft, the USS Oklahoma
18 sustained multiple torpedo hits, which caused it
19 to quickly capsize. The attack on the ship
20 resulted in the deaths of 429 crewmen, including
21 Everhart. These that could not be identified
22 were buried in two cemeteries until 1947 when
23 they were exhumed -- oh, I hate that word --
24 disinterred and sent to labs to be identified.
25 They -- only 35 could be identified.

1 And then in 1949, they were instructed to
2 be reburied, and -- in 46 grave sites. But then
3 in 2015, they were ordered to disinter them
4
5 again, and tried to identify th em. Shipmate
6 Everhart was identified on July 3rd, 2018, and
7 I'm proud to say I represented the new CNO,
8 Admiral Gilday, and served as the Navy Arlington
9 lady last Tuesday when he was buried with full
10 military honors, and he had over 30 friends and
11 family attend.

12 I also want to thank the people that have
13 called me and I've been able to serve as the Navy
14 Arlington lady for them.

15 Shipmate Everhart would have been 107
16 years old at this time. Thank you. Shipmates,
17 have a great convention.

18
19 UNIDENTIFIED LA PNP: Good afternoon. I feel
20 like I'm a piece of history. I was National
21 President in 1983, '84, and my hat all but fell
22 off. But I served with Dan Spalding and I served
23 with Chuck McIntyre, and I wish you guys a
24 wonderful convention. God Bless America.

1 (Assembly claps as Auxiliary Ladies
2 exit the conference room.)

3
4 PRESIDENT: We will continue with the Legislative
5 brief.

6 NED: Anyway, Shipmates, what I want to do is
7 just do a quick review. I will say this: One of
8 our highlights of this year, among many Bills
9 that we've gotten through, was HR 299. That was
10 the Blue Order Agent Orange. We got that
11 through. And so I just want to say that is the
12 one thing that we got. We got a lot of kickback
13 on it because we'd been going with the Senate
14 version. We went with the House version. But,
15 you know, as I've always said, if you don't get
16 your foot in the door, you'll never do it. So we
17 are still pushing for it, and it all had to do
18 with the definitions of territorial waters,
19 adverses, et cetera, et cetera. And if you want
20 to either talk to myself or John Davis or Chris
21 Slawinski, we can give you a little bit more
22 information on those definitions. We did get it
23 through.

24 A little update on 299. Shortly after it
25 was passed, the Secretary of VA put a stay on

1 it -- in other words, he put a hold on it -- for
2 applications. Last week I signed a letter off,
3 and joined with other VSOs, not only to the key
4
5 members of Congress, but a letter directly to the
6 White House, saying the stay has got to stop. If
7 you deal with what's going on with the world
8 about suicides, you'll understand why. The
9 majority of the suicides are coming from the
10 individuals that had a lot of the VA -- different
11 situations with Vietnam. So it's not an ending.
12 We're still fighting to make sure everyone gets
13 involved.

14 As for the active duty issues, I'm going
15 to give you a rundown of what we're fighting for.
16 And I will say this, I am the co-chairman of the
17 CLC -- excuse me; not CLC; that was many years
18 ago -- the Military Coalition.

19 And despite what you may think about the
20 Military Coalition, we have -- correct me if I'm
21 wrong, Jonathan -- 33 members of that coalition,
22 other veterans groups, and a representation of
23 over 5.5 million. So there is some
24 representation that's going on through all the
25 organizations that we're doing.

1 One of the things about the Military
2 Coalition is we sent over what we call a shopping
3 list, and that shopping list is whatever the
4 House gives, what the Senate gives, and then what
5 the Military Coalition goes (sic), and it doesn't
6 go lightly because the chairs -- as most of us
7 saw, I'm on the Personnel Subcommittee, and the
8 rest of the leg team is on -- dispersed to the
9 other committees themselves.

10 Tuition assistance for members of the
11 Armed Forces. You've heard Shipmate Joe talk a
12 little bit about the price of education. You
13 take wherever you are in your geographic areas,
14 you're hearing a lot of things about free
15 education, free college, and everything else, it
16 still comes down to, as I've addressed with the
17 Senior Enlisted Academy and other folks, it costs
18 money. That's why we need to keep -- continue to
19 push on.

20 Information regarding claims on the TAP
21 program: Notice of separating a service or
22 rights under the Servicemen's Civil Relief Act.
23 Active duty people have to be given a out brief,
24 if you will, when they leave active duty, and
25 it's something that we're trying -- we are

1 finding out that maybe they're not getting that
2 extra check. We're not criticizing the active
3 duty side, but we want to get the sign-in Board
4 to say: This is what we're hearing.

5 Continued assistance to schools with
6 significant numbers of military dependent
7 students. A lot of you probably have had your
8 own children go to schools, and those issues are
9 very key from the standpoint of not only
10 classroom sizes, but also the benefits and things
11 they get from their respective education systems.
12 That's very key. And one of the things is they
13 have those things called the different things
14 that -- the free lunch card, and those type of
15 things, and they can ask you to check off if
16 you're a military dependent, if you will, or
17 belong to a military family. We don't recall is
18 "eyes to guys, to the gals" who are dependents.
19 Remember now, we have females in the military,
20 from the standpoint they also have spouses.
21 Okay.

22 Now, going along with the absences of
23 schools with military dependents. We're also
24 dealing with temporary increases or rates of
25 basic allowances for housing. Let me talk a

1 little bit about the housing issue. About a
2 month ago, I sat down with DOD's house- --
3 housing people, and one of the things that's
4 going on right now is that the privatization of
5 base housing. We can say what we want about
6 different things like that, and if we don't get
7 in there -- and DOD is asking that we get our
8 folks on those advisory panels within the bases.
9 Shipmates, get on those advisory councils. They
10 want to hear from us. Yes, in some of the large
11 complexes -- I know they have this in Hawaii. I
12 know they have this in Norfolk. It may be
13 through other bases where they're having retirees
14 go in and they're occupying government housing as
15 well.

16 Another big thing is the modification to
17 authority to reimburse state licensures and
18 certification costs of a spouse member arising
19 from relocation, and we're talking a credit of
20 between \$500 to \$1,000. When you talk about
21 certification, you're talking a number of
22 different things. It could be hairdresser. It
23 could be a teacher. It could be whatever
24 requirement of that respective state or
25 Commonwealth that they want to put on there.

1 What we're trying to say is: Give them the break
2 because of the fact that they're the cause of
3 being shipped there, if you will, or being
4 transferred there within their own geographic
5 location. Those states, we have pushed for the
6 Senate to reach out and do.

7 So we want reimbursement from \$500 to up
8 to \$1,000, and all they have to do is just submit
9 it. In some cases, some States are saying: Just
10 make sure that's on your tax forms, and you'll be
11 given the tax credit, as it should be. A
12 hairstresser -- and I can state from my daughter's
13 situation, who lives in Goose Creek -- her
14 transferring from the Commonwealth of Virginia to
15 South Carolina was over \$575. And I don't know
16 about you, but that's a lot of money, and she
17 could be given a credit for that because that in
18 -- her husband is stationed there. He retired
19 and he lives there, but at the same time, a
20 little reimbursement is always appreciated.

21 Business cases analysis performed as part
22 of the defense resale system. Right now, since
23 we've convened here at this convention, veterans
24 are now going to be allowed to be shopping at our
25 Exchanges and our Commissaries. Guess what they

1 found out? You can have an ID card. But what
2 about those folks that do not have an ID card?

3 Now, just a show of hands, those who have
4 majorly concentrated areas, how many of your
5 Commissaries and Exchanges are still located on
6 bases? Now, how are they supposed to get on the
7 base? And for whatever reason, that was never
8 considered. So now, they're looking at using the
9 VA card, which is going to add more
10 responsibility and securities for our base
11 commanders. I will tell you this: I did not
12 bother Captain Ross this morning on that because
13 that's another issue that those type of
14 commanders have to deal with, and the securities
15 of those folks that are getting on bases.

16 The larger ones that I know of, Hawaii
17 and Norfolk, and some of the others, including,
18 Charleston, I believe, have Commissaries and
19 Exchanges outside the bases. There was a thing
20 about foot traffic that goes into these bases
21 from the Exchange and also the Commissaries.
22 Once again, get on the advisory boards. DOD has
23 encouraged that. Foot traffic that goes in our
24 Commissaries now ranges in the pay grades of E5
25 and E6s, and retirees. That's where most of it

1 is. If they don't hear from you on these
2 advisory councils, which again, it gets you into
3 the base advisory councils, which DOD is pushing.
4 Please, get on there.

5 Protection for members in the Armed
6 Forces and their dependents residing in
7 privatized military housing. We're talking about
8 tenants rights. What are the rights when they
9 live in government housing? Some of us that we
10 lived in government housing, you know, we can say
11 we had none. Where are those -- but since it's
12 been privatized, guess what? There's issues of
13 having tenants rights. Some of you flew here.
14 You know, what are your rights when you flew
15 here? Same thing is happening. We're talking
16 about protection against retaliation, if you have
17 a complaint about the housing management.
18 Ability to withhold rent establishes a dispute
19 and resolution processes.

20 I'm not going to mention where I found
21 one housing that my daughter lived in, but it was
22 brand new housing, and I walked outside one night
23 with my grandkids, and I walked back in. I said,
24 why is the sprinkler watering your house? She
25 said, dad, don't push it. I know where you work.

1 You got a big mouth in Washington. Good. So why
2 are we watering the house? And if you get all
3 this water on the house, it kind of does things
4 to the soil, and then it gets into the concrete.
5 And guess what it does? And I don't have to go
6 any further. She goes, I called housing and I
7 was given a six-month wait to get this little
8 sprinkler thing. I said, your husband is a
9 nuclear submarine -- I got nothing against those;
10 trust me; my son-in-law -- nuclear submarine
11 electrician. And I said, why doesn't he just go
12 out there at midnight and turn the little spigot
13 thing to get the grass a little bit greener,
14 other than the mold that's greener than his grass
15 on his house. Guess what he did? Got up that
16 morning, went out and changed it. Bingo.
17 Problem was solved. Those are some of the issues
18 that we have with housing.

19 Disclose of the home history of hazards.
20 Some of the things you've been hearing about is
21 the mold. It's a very big issue right now.
22 They're looking at trying to take care of it with
23 privatized housing. Radon, they're trying to
24 ensure that those type of coverage in housing is
25 covered. A lot of the dependent children that

1 are living in housing are coming up with
2 respiratory issues. Part of that respiratory
3 issue leads to pneumonia. And if you have mold,
4 you have imbalanced air quality, and that's a big
5 issue, and so they're trying to tie that in with
6 the medical issues of going into and dealing with
7 the housing issues. So radon testing for
8 privatized military housing is going to be
9 pushed.

10 Requirements for certain prescription
11 drug labels. That's a big thing right now
12 because of the opioid situation. And unless you
13 really don't have an understanding about those
14 things, that's very dangerous. And I'm not
15 taking anything down from the medical folks that
16 are here, whether they've got nursing experiences
17 or even a hospital foreman. That is a big issue
18 with the prescription drugs that we have and the
19 amount of the MGs -- the total grams that they're
20 getting in those medicines. It's got to be under
21 control, and we're trying to make sure that
22 happens. The Defense Health Agency has
23 recognized that on the total spectrum of all
24 medical facilities, which are now under DHA.
25 Okay. Emma Lona just left. She was our greatest

1 ally. She was on a couple covers of our FRA
2 Today. She just retired. She's a physician.
3 She understands the opoid. If you can get
4 involved with that, please get involved. And
5 it's not just going to the clinics. It's dealing
6 with the situation that's in school that affects
7 their mental capacity to learn.

8 Leadership at inter-programs at
9 Department of Defense of Veteran Affairs. The VA
10 still has their issues, and I don't think I have
11 to go any further than that. We've been pushing.
12 Trust me. We are on their committees, with the
13 VA. We are also very much involved with the
14 executive sessions that we have with the
15 Secretary of VA. They have issues, as always.
16 And we're trying to take that as -- okay? --
17 let's work on that a little bit better.

18 Suicides among active duty. That's high.
19 It's very high because of the fact that we know
20 who's taking care of it. I don't want another
21 pie graph. I don't want more of the little bar
22 graphs. Sit down and talk to them. What is
23 being done, not only from the VA side? And you
24 saw about the getting the card. We've got a
25 Shipmate that called me one night at home and

1 said, Tom, I'll see you in the next world. What
2 do you mean you're going to see me in the next
3 world? He goes, I've had it because of trying to
4 get re-employed and everything else through OPM,
5 and I'm not going to get into their ways of doing
6 things. He hung up with me, and he says, next
7 time you hear from me, it'll be at a funeral. I
8 immediately called the VA people on that card.

9 The VA 1-800 number works. After I
10 called the VA, press 1, they were in contact with
11 the police department in Philadelphia. They went
12 to this Shipmate's house. He called me three
13 hours later. He goes, why did you do that? He
14 says, I told you I didn't want to talk to you
15 again because of this. I said, this is no joke,
16 Jack. Some people -- we've got to care about
17 these shipmates if we're going through these
18 things, not only because, again, find somebody to
19 listen, but they do have issues that they have to
20 deal with. So check in wherever you can with a
21 Veteran. You know, I'm not saying you got to get
22 on their Christmas card list or anything like
23 that, but you know, all it takes is, "what's
24 up?", and go from there.

25 Reports of suicide among members of the

1 Armed Forces. That's a big issue. Saturday, if
2 you're here for the banquet, my sons came also to
3 show. That's probably one of his biggest issues
4 of getting a phone call in the middle of the
5 night from his Command Master Chief that someone
6 tried to commit suicide or spousal abuse. That's
7 worse than probably anything else that you find
8 in the UCMJ, and you can't do that with the UCMJ.
9 But what do you do about a situation from an
10 individual who has? If you haven't been aboard a
11 Navy ship lately, let me tell you, it's not a lot
12 of "Dear John" letters. It's all about what
13 these individuals can get on these ships from
14 emails, and emails are received on these ships,
15 which has an effect. And also, not only does it
16 have an affect on readiness, personnel readiness,
17 but it has to do with their situation of
18 operational readiness.

19 Different things of burn pits. That's a
20 big thing because of the current wars that we're
21 having over there. That is the number --
22 respiratory issue that we're dealing with.
23 That's over there and what we have over in the
24 Middle East. That is a big thing. It still has
25 to be evaluated, not only evaluated, but what is

1 the cause and effect that it's having on, again,
2 the breathing issues of respiratory.

3 It's not like those individuals that
4 you're hearing on the news. A good friend of
5 mine, his son, 18 years old, who was just on
6 national TV because he was smoking the viper
7 (sic) -- or the vapor thing on JUUL, J-U-U-L.
8 Eighteen years old. He's around up there in the
9 Great Lakes. He's got the lungs of a 75-year-old
10 man. That's real. But the whole thing is: How
11 is that getting out into our schools? And how is
12 that being accepted? Fortunately, some people
13 are finally saying enough is enough on those type
14 of things. So we have ideas.

15 Improvements in child care. Not only the
16 fact that we're having situations with people
17 getting into child care, we still have parents
18 out there that don't believe in vaccinations or
19 inoculations. And in some school systems, they
20 say, well, that's my right. That may be your
21 right, but if you get somebody that is right
22 along side of you and comes down with the
23 measles, what else are they going to get? So it
24 does have a situation against the individuals
25 that are in the schools. It's a very tough draw

1 for school systems to say: Unless you get the
2 required shots, you can't come to school. Well,
3 guess what they do? They run off to their
4 Congressional people. Now, we have one Shipmate
5 that we're looking at right now. He understands
6 the legislative process situation is. That's
7 not the Constitution. If you're going to be
8 infected, why should you infect other people?
9 That's not a part of the Constitution.

10 Child care issues are very big, and they
11 might have situations with abuse. So it's a
12 total family involvement that we're talking about
13 with these issues.

14 Shipmates, letters have been sent. When
15 we get back, we're also going to be dealing with
16 going up on the Hill again to try to listen.
17 It's difficult when you're only dealing with
18 staffers when the Congressional leadership is
19 only dealing with one fire, and I think you know
20 what I'm talking about. I don't care what side
21 of the island you're on, and that's the issue
22 right now. Sixty-three items we have on our Bill
23 tracker, and I think -- correct me, John, if I'm
24 wrong -- but only three or four have been passed,
25 and the big one, of course, is the Agent Orange.

1 The same Bills that were on there last year.

2 Folks, when we send out the "Making
3 Waves", jump on that. Get into the email and get
4 your Shipmates in your branches to say: Click it
5 now, man, and get your voice heard. It's okay to
6 talk to your Congressional leadership. One of
7 the things that I find out from talking to active
8 duty folks is they're afraid of one group of
9 people. I got nothing against them. They're
10 part of the Navy, and it's called the JAG Corps.
11 One of the situations is they don't want them
12 talking to their Congressional leadership. If
13 you don't talk to Congressional leaderships about
14 the causes and effects that some of these Bills
15 are having, guess what? The Bills won't get
16 passed.

17 So the more that you can push on your own
18 delegations, your individuals that are
19 representing you, regardless where you live, from
20 Maine all the way down to San Diego -- I don't
21 care -- talk to them. Tell them. What are you
22 doing about this? The Bill Tracker was assigned
23 for one thing. You can click on it. You click
24 on the Bill, and it gives you the entire thing
25 under congress.gov. And it will tell you who has

1 voted and who has not on these issues. To me --
2 and I come up with this thing called the soft
3 Bills and the hard Bills. The soft Bills are
4 Navy changes or let's make a point out of
5 somebody. Now, the hard Bills are the ones that
6 are going to cost money and deal with immediate
7 action to take care of things, aside from
8 different committees.

9 Commissary benefits. Folks, you got to
10 get in there and push it. If there's things that
11 are not on the shelves that you want to do, go,
12 get on those advisory councils. They were crying
13 for that representation from the retired
14 community as well, as to what went on. I'm not
15 saying you got to go in there. This is not about
16 selling an application. This is about
17 involvement, especially with Commissaries and
18 Exchanges. They want to hear about it. Please
19 get on there. Also get on your health benefits.
20 And if you can, you can do it on your bases
21 dealing with the housing issues as well.

22 And at this time, I'll turn it over to
23 Shipmate John Davis to continue on. Thank you.

24

25 SHIPMATE DAVIS: Good afternoon, Shipmates.

1 (Assembly: Good afternoon)

2
3 DLP DAVIS: I'm John Davis, Director of
4 Legislative Programs, and I am the co-chair of
5 the Military Coalition Retiree Policy Committee.
6 So I work on a lot of the retiree issues as part
7 of the coalition. I've been on -- I've been
8 co-chairman of that committee since -- well,
9 about 12 years now.

10 First of all, I want to talk to you
11 about, you know, spending Bills. The House cast
12 a lot of their Bills early on. They went over to
13 the Senate. Senate was unable to pass any of
14 their Bills -- any of the spending Bills. But
15 then they came out -- they never did do a budget
16 resolution, which basically gives -- tells the
17 communities how much they can spend. So as we
18 went through the process for the authorization
19 and the appropriations, there was a lot of
20 disagreement as to how much we could even spend.

21 So for example, with Defense, the Trump
22 people put in a budget for 750 billion. The
23 house Democrats came out and said we're going to
24 spend 716 billion, and -- if we'd agree, and
25 eventually ended up with something like -- I

1 think it was 738 billion. They finally did come
2 to an agreement, and things are moving forward
3 now until all of a sudden this impeachment thing
4 blew up the last few days.

5 So we're going to have a continued
6 resolution, which means they're not going to be
7 able to spend more than they did this current
8 year, which is what we were hoping they would do.
9 So it'll be flatline spending until they finally
10 get a real budget passed.

11 I'm also working on a defense
12 authorization Bill. Both House and Senate have
13 passed their versions. The House has a lot of
14 great things in it we like. For example, it's
15 got the SBP-VSC (sic) offset repeal, and I would
16 call that the widow's tax. That's in there. And
17 they've got the Senate Bill that basically allows
18 a cut of 18,000 medical staff people from the
19 current medical military staff of about 130,000.
20 That's a big cut, and we basically said we're not
21 actually opposed to it, but we want to have an
22 explanation and some verification that it's not
23 going to impact the beneficiaries, and we haven't
24 been able to get that.

25 So the House Bill has a provision in

1 there saying that they'll study it for a year and
2 come back and give a report by the GAO on whether
3 or not it's going to impact your benefits. Okay.

4 I'm just curious here. How many people
5 here use military treatment facilities for their
6 care?

7
8 (Numerous Delegates raise their
9 hands.)

10
11 DLP DAVIS: Okay. Quite a bit. Okay. So those
12 cuts will have a definite impact on you, so we're
13 finding that. And as I said, the House Bill
14 prohibits it for a year, and there has to be a
15 study done by the GAO, and they have to give a
16 report to the House Committee so we'll be able to
17 find out how bad that really is. That's a big
18 one.

19 One of the big issues with the Retirement
20 Committee is concurrent receipt. I worked very
21 hard on trying to get that Bill attached to one
22 of the defense authorization Bills. I put an
23 amendment in each House. The Senate floor and
24 the House floor had an amendment to amend the
25 defense authorization Bills as they came through,

1 and they were not called for a vote,
2 unfortunately. So we're going to just go back to
3 the drawing board and try it again next year.
4 But the SBP-DIC offset repeal is in the House
5 Bill. That's the widow's tax. That's a lot of
6 money for widows. They get their full benefits
7 if that passes. That's a big -- and I hope you
8 would take a look at the action center and chime
9 in on that.

10 Something else that's really nice is that
11 there's no Tricare fee increase this year through
12 either the Senate or the House defense
13 authorization Bill. So they're not shifting
14 anymore cost to you, your benefits -- you know,
15 taking away your benefits. So we're very proud
16 of that. I do want to remind everybody, though,
17 in 2017, they did pass some pharmacy increases,
18 and they got a long tail. And I think January
19 2020 there's going to be a couple dollars added
20 to your co-pays on some of your prescription
21 drugs, and again in 2022, there'll be a few
22 dollars added. That's part of that increase that
23 occurred in 2017. It's just got a long tail on
24 it. So we'll make every effort, if we can, to
25 try and repeal those before they take effect, but

1 that's going to be a very uphill battle.

2 Comments at the Action Center. It's a
3 very effective, very user-friendly way to use it.
4 I'm just curious. How many people here use the
5 Action Center?

6
7 (Numerous Delegates raise their
8 hands.)

9
10 DLP DAVIS: Okay. Just about everybody. Okay.
11 Great. That's fantastic. That's important. So
12 anyway, that's the big thing right now, to wait
13 and see what's going to happen with the House
14 Bill, the Senate defense authorization Bills.
15 Now they've got to go into what they call a
16 conference committee. They've got to resolve the
17 differences between the two Bills. That's on the
18 Action Center. I'd love it if you would go on
19 there and chime in on that. All you've got to do
20 is hit a couple of buttons. You've got a
21 pre-written letter for your Congressman and your
22 Senator, and you can change it if you want to,
23 you know, but by and large, you can just hit a
24 button. It'll go to your elected officials.

25 I already mentioned there's no Tricare

1 fee increase this year. If you want to talk real
2 quickly, Carrie Sprotszki (phonetic) does our
3 health care, and she's not here, so I'm going to
4 very quickly go over that. Because again, I
5 mentioned the medical staff cuts. That's a
6 biggie. That's in the Senate defense
7 authorization Bill.

8 The basic whole theme on our lobbying
9 effort on health care is that we believe the
10 health care benefit should reflect the extraneous
11 sacrifices you have made with 20 or more years of
12 military service that in effect you've, in part
13 -- at least in part, paid a big part of your
14 premium already with your military service, and
15 we continue to believe that and argue that on
16 Capitol Hill.

17 A new one that's come up is the Feres
18 doctrine, which was a 1950 Supreme Court decision
19 which said military people could not sue even if
20 there's a medical malpractice accident. And they
21 put that in there, so that would repeal that. So
22 in the case of negligence by an NTF, you would be
23 able to sue for medical malpractice and be made
24 whole again. We think that's a good idea.

25 The other one is not a big one, but it's

1 a big one on Capitol Hill is that military
2 treatment facilities are being taken over by the
3 Defense Health Agency. They were run by the
4 Navy, the Air Force, the Army. Now they're going
5 to be under one agency, and that's a big much ado
6 about nothing, quite frankly, but it's important,
7 and they think it's going to streamline the
8 bureaucracy. We hope so. Okay.

9 With that, I will leave it -- switch it
10 over to Chris Slawinski, our Veterans Service
11 Officer.

12

13 UNIDENTIFIED DELEGATE: He had a question.

14

15 DLP DAVIS: Oh, yes.

16

17 RPSR: Shipmate Richmond, Delegate, Branch 22. I
18 just think for the concurrent receipt thing that
19 we need to change our plan of attack when you're
20 talking to Congress. Use a word that maybe will
21 scare them into doing it. It's discriminatory.
22 If you can have 50 percent disability and you get
23 full concurrent receipt, someone has 40 percent
24 disability, they get their VA money, but it's
25 taken out of their Navy check, they get nothing

1 but the tax benefit. It's discriminatory.
2 They're discriminating against a class of
3 individuals, and I think that's the tactic you
4 need to take when you're talking to them instead
5 of just trying to say, well, we should get more
6 money. Just start throwing that word around,
7 "it's discriminatory".
8

9 DLP DAVIS: Yeah, it is. Well, that's basically
10 the item we use is why is it, for example, like
11 you said, if you have 50 percent disability, you
12 get everything --
13

14 RPSR: Right
15

16 DLP DAVIS: -- you have 40 percent, you don't get
17 anything.
18

19 RPSR: Yeah.
20

21 DLP DAVIS: And we answer back, because we can't
22 afford it. So when we roll back, say, okay. Can
23 we do this -- phase in -- can we phase it in?
24 And that's always been, you know, sort of the
25 last thing we can do is try and phase it in. I

1 remember a few years ago we had, like, six or
2 seven different kinds. You know, it's how are
3 you going to phase it in, you know? And even
4 that, that has not -- just the powers that be
5 don't want to spend the money. But they do want
6 us to deal with the widow's tax, and that's -- if
7 we get that out of the way, then I think we have
8 a better shot, too, with the concurrent receipt.
9 So I appreciate your concern.

10

11 RPSR: Yeah

12

13 DLP DAVIS: Thank you. Any other questions?

14

15 (No verbal response).

16

17 DLP DAVIS: All right. Chris.

18

19 NSD: I am National Service Director, Chris
20 Slawinski. As John mentioned, he's a co-chair of
21 the Retiree Committee. I serve as a co-chair on
22 the Guard Reserve Committee and also the Veterans
23 Committee. I've been a member of both those
24 committees for 15 years now. They're very active
25 in the Coalition on the issues that we are taking

1 on. One of the things that we fought very hard
2 for was, as Tom mentioned, the blue water -- HR
3 299. And once that was passed, we thought we had
4 a major victory because we also had a litigation
5 that approved that went through the Federal
6 court. It was called Procopio versus Wilkie.

7 And in that case, a blue water sailor was
8 basically deemed that they should have included
9 him, because the way that they've interpreted --
10 the VA interprets the offshore waters is
11 incorrect, and so they approved -- the veterans
12 won, and the VA decided not to pursue it at the
13 Supreme Court level so it became law 18 months --
14 shortly after that, 180 days after that. So once
15 that happened, Congress basically said, okay.
16 This makes HR 299 a little less expensive for us,
17 so we're going to push that through. Ollie
18 pushed it through. There was a provision in
19 there that said that VA would have a stay until
20 January 1st, 2020.

21 And so we, as a coalition, said that that
22 stay is for 299. Well, VA's interpretation is
23 that it's a stay on anything that's blue water
24 associated. A lot of other service
25 organizations, along with Fleet Reserve

1 Association had a press conference yesterday, and
2 also sent a letter to the White House, saying --
3 asking the Administration to lift the stay. And
4 I know that it should be Brian Condon, from our
5 staff, who was there. And FRA was mentioned
6 numerous times during the press conference
7 because we have been a leader in this issue, and
8 they understand that a lot of our members are
9 affected by the outcome of this Bill. So we are
10 continuing to fight to get this resolved, and
11 that's one of the things that my committee, the
12 Veterans Committee, and also us, as members of
13 the Coalition and members of the Veterans Service
14 Organizations, have been fighting for.

15 The Veteran Service Foundation, again,
16 it's a 501(c)(3) foundation. We are in the
17 process of trying to build up revenue from that
18 foundation. Shipmate -- not Shipmate, but
19 Finance Officer Bryan Proctor will probably give
20 a brief report on the Healthy Wealthy Wise
21 Conference that was postponed until 2020. We
22 initially wanted to have it the same week, and
23 due to some issues of logistics and such, it was
24 deemed it would be more feasible to push it back
25 to either spring or summer of 2020, so we're

1 working on trying to get that taken care of.

2 And as the Standing Committee for the
3 Veterans Service, we have been working very hard
4 on trying to improve the number of Veterans
5 service officers that we have within the
6 branches. And I, in my travels this past year,
7 I've gotten some good recommendations. There's
8 some small branches that have said -- that
9 they're saying that they can't -- they don't have
10 a person that's willing to do it, but they have a
11 good relationship with the County or State
12 service officers that are local. And what we
13 want to do is maybe start a referral process with
14 that, and that's something our committee is going
15 to discuss so that if you don't have -- if you're
16 a smaller branch, but you do have representation
17 from the County or State service officers, maybe
18 get a relationship with them. Say, hey, we want
19 to, you know, basically be able to refer our
20 members to you to get claims done, and also see
21 if you can do some outreach with them and have,
22 like, magazines, and things like that available
23 for them.

24 And then, finally, within the Veterans
25 Service Committee, also, is the Voluntary Service

1 Program. And in the report that I provided,
2 we're still struggling to try to get to that
3 member status again. We're still an associate
4 member in a nonvoting status. And what we need
5 to do is get more branches engaged with the VA
6 medical centers and the outpatient clinics to,
7 basically, get their volunteer programs become a
8 local rep or dep. The great thing about it is we
9 meet once a quarter. It gives you an opportunity
10 to find out what needs are in that community
11 within the VA. And if you volunteer there, you
12 can wear an FRA shirt or unique hat, and you'd be
13 surprised how many conversations start up with,
14 hey, so you served in the Navy? So did I. And
15 then you can start talking to them about this
16 great organization, Fleet Reserve Association.
17 With that, I'm going to turn it back over to the
18 National Executive Director, unless there's
19 questions.

20
21 (No verbal response)

22
23 NSD: I like it when there's no questions.

24
25 NED: Thank you. Just so you know, there is an

1 individual on Norfolk at Fleet Forces, and he
2 keeps me up on what's going on from the
3 standpoint of closures when you start talking
4 about providers at military hospitals, and
5 Norfolk is one of the bigger ones. So those that
6 are on the east coast, let's just stop picking on
7 them, but you've also got the situation that
8 could start to build up even around the San Diego
9 area when we start talking about care. And one
10 of the things is: Where does the family member
11 go for care? You know, you've got that service
12 member that goes out and gets deployed, and then
13 all of a sudden somebody in the family gets sick.
14 Where do I go? That's a very real thing. And
15 when they only have certain hours. Okay?

16 Recently, I was down in the Tidewater
17 area doing some other things, and one of the
18 things that I noticed were the hours of operation
19 at a place at the amphibious base, a Joint
20 Expeditionary Base, Little Creek Fort Story, was
21 a place called Boone Clinic. They don't have all
22 the expertise there because they can't afford the
23 hours to provide services.

24 And then you got the cutbacks that are
25 happening at Portsmouth Naval Hospital. And then

1 if you ever -- have ever had the great adventure
2 of trying to go through the tunnel after 1500,
3 and trying to get medical care, and then you got
4 the Langley folks involved, let me tell you, it's
5 very real. I don't even want to -- even suggest
6 to what the situation is -- could be around
7 Balboa in the San Diego area or those type of
8 things. This is a very real thing.

9 Fleet Force Master Chief O'Rawe is
10 keeping us informed with things, and says, oh, by
11 the way, Tom, here's something to look at, and
12 would you please be our mouthpiece and speak. So
13 we do have that connection, at least from the
14 Fleet Forces, because there's a group down there
15 that's called the Gray Beard Society.

16 Now, nothing against our female
17 counterparts who belong to this because they
18 don't have gray beards, but at the same time, we
19 do have the retiree community that's involved
20 with that. And one of the things that hes doing
21 is: If I can get you information about at least
22 what's going on in the Atlantic Fleet side, can
23 you push for us, please, to be that conduit so
24 they don't get in trouble? And I asked him, I
25 said, Master Chief, where is the fleet surgeon on

1 your staff site? That was the question I asked
2 him. And he said, Tom, I can't talk about that
3 for obvious reasons. So he came to us to say:
4 Can you make it happen? So he's feeding us
5 information so we can get a little bit more -- I
6 don't want to say the after war, but more of a
7 direct hit.

8 Again, thank you very much. Are there
9 any other questions you might have for us? We're
10 going to be around all week. Yes, we know it's a
11 difficult issue with what's going on in
12 Washington, and all I can say is please stay in
13 touch. And at this time, I give the mike to the
14 National President, Shipmate National President.

15
16 PRESIDENT: Thank you, FRA Legislative Team, for
17 your update. I just want to announce that I have
18 appointed Past Regional President South Central
19 Don Gibson to chair the Time and Place Committee.
20 So if there's any interested regions or branches
21 out there that's interested in hosting the 2021
22 Convention, I would encourage you to get with
23 them and they will report out tomorrow afternoon
24 when all the other committee reports are out. So
25 see Shipmate Don Gibson.

1 The first business session of the 92nd
2 National Convention will now be recessed. The
3 second business session will continue promptly at
4 1300 Thursday afternoon in this room. And
5 please, again, the committee starts meeting at 9
6 o'clock tomorrow morning, and be ready to report
7 out at 1300. Shipmate National Chaplain, will
8 you close the Bible.

9
10 CHAPLAIN: Shipmate National President, the Bible
11 is closed.

12
13 PRESIDENT: Thank you, Shipmate. (Taps the gavel
14 to signify the closure of the first business
15 session.)
