2	whole person by any professional measurement. As
3	noted in his bio, he is a native of Ashland,
4	Mississippi, just a few short miles from here,
5	from Memphis.
6	I will venture to say, Captain, that your
7	diversity of accomplishments and work ethics
8	started as a young man in your upbringing in the
9	great state of Mississippi.
10	Captain Ross enlisted in the United
11	States Navy as Boats Mate.
12

ship, warfare or rest on your laurels, but quickly excelled and exceeded in your Naval career. Captain Ross has served on aviation, amphibious, fuels, ammunition, and submarine repair ships at sea, both stateside and overseas. He served in readiness and training as a Correctional Specialist, and later on the board of INSURV and Survey, our most dreaded, who those of us who have been through INSURVs understand that.

His extensive warfare knowledge and port operations enabled him to become the Director of Waterfront Operations under Commander, Navy Region Mid-Atlantic, Norfolk, Virginia, and that is one heck of a large set of real estate, I might add, too, with Norfolk.

Notable of all onshore assignments were as Executive Officer of Naval Station, Newport, Rhode Island, and at Guantanamo Bay Cuba. He was director for Enlisted Distribution, PERS 40, the Naval Military Personnel Command here in Millington, and now as Commanding Officer of the Naval Support Activity Mid-South.

Sir, I will remiss if I didn't mention this, but I remember the great promise of a

former Director of Enlisted Per	sonnel, PERS 40
MPC, who also served in Milling	ton as Commanding
Officer of Naval Air Station, C	aptain Rick
Branch, and I don't know if you	ı knew that, but
Rick was a great individual as	a detailer.

Sir, these are benchmarks for the enlisted deck place to -- as a Captain, which encapsulated a milestone career that quickly defines you as a leader. For this, we say, thank you.

With your record, it took no surprise that you were selected as Commanding Officer of Navy Short Command. The only exception, perhaps, and I quote from your bio, was a reluctance to return to shore duty. After all, where do Boats Mates belong?

NED: Sir, you are a neighbor with a mainstay of wealth, from enlisted to lead Captain. You have raised the bar of profound excellence which very few can only dream of. We are honored to have you as our keynote speaker, and we welcome you aboard. May I introduce you to the oldest sea

11	call you? I said, Boats. He's a lead captain,
12	now. And I thought, well, I always be Boats.
13	I'm proud of that, and I'm proud to be able to
14	help bring up the younger generations of our
15	of our sailors our young sailors. It's
16	certainly different a different time than when
17	you all were leading this organization to now.

CAPTAIN ROSS: Thank you all for your patience.

And again, good morning, and thanks for having me
here today to be part of your conference. I want
to thank each of you for the service, and I'm
honored to have to watch all of those who have
gone before me.

And speaking of watch, I'd like to talk to you about the watch. The watch is not stood by ships, not carriers, not destroyers or frigates. The watch is not stood by aircraft, not jets, not cargo planes, not helicopters. And in the 243 years, 244 next month, as we celebrate another Navy birthday, bombs and bullets, I've done a lot to improve our arms in battle, but they have not stood the watch. Instead, it's our people that stood the watch, our sailors and marines, active and reserves, enlisted officers, and today I'm going to tell you something about some of those people.

Like Petty Officer Hernandez, she's from Miami, Florida. She stands watch as a steel worker in Pascagoula, Mississippi with the Seabee battalion. She says she's proud to serve the

Navy because it brings honor, sense of pride in knowing that she's part of the one percent who wanted to serve her country.

Or Lieutenant Michael Murphy, who is from Lebanon, Tennessee. He stands watch as a navigator on board the USS New York. As most of you know, that ship was literally forged from the steel of the World Trade Center. He said that almost every person serving on board that ship was affected in some way by the events of September the 11th. There aren't many mainstay ships where you can attach yourself to what that ship represents, but on board New York, it's a connection made daily with everyone on board.

We have Petty Officer Hendricks from Wilson, North Carolina. Petty Officer Wilson is -- Hendricks is stationed out of Sasebo Japan on board the USS Germantown. Some of you might remember the Germantown. The unique thing about Petty Officer Hendricks is that he's carrying on a family tradition, as his father also served on board that ship, albeit, it's a more modern Germantown than in his father's day.

From Oak Harbor, Washington, we have Petty Officer Felix (phonetic). He's a Naval

Aircrewman with Reconnaissance Wing 10. If you know those guys, they fly the P-H beside it, and they are always watching what's under the water.

These are just four of the more than 380,000 actives and reserves that we have standing watch today, and I assure you each of them has a story that if you heard it, your pride in the nation would grow. Your anxiety about the world around us will start to fade away. I can tell you that the security of our nation is in great hands.

So what about me and what I do out at the Installation? And as most of you remember, it used to be called the Air Station. We got to celebrate our history over the past few years, both the centennial military presence in the area, and 75 years since the Navy made Mid-South its home. I know that many people here thought that when the planes stopped flying that we were gone, but that's far from the case. We keep carrying on the commission of support, services and strength that spans more than a century. It's a tradition I'm proud to carry on each day as I put on this uniform.

When I'm out in the local community, I

get the opportunity to meet so many veterans like yourself who served in this Installation I command now. Knowing that I'm carrying on the tradition of generations of veterans who have gone before me makes my tour as a commanding officer an extreme privilege.

So why are we here, a Naval base in landlocked Tennessee? The answer to that goes back to 1921, and a date that would live in infamy. This location was the first to provide the military as an Airfield Corps during its infancy of military aviation more than 100 years ago. The government began the process of purchasing the land for a Park Field during World War I, but the purchase was completed well after the war. That's bureaucracy for you, and as of today, that hasn't changed much.

After the attack on Pearl Harbor December 1941, the Secretary of the Navy at the time, Frank Knox, decided that maybe it would be a good idea to move some of the noncombative aviation units inward to land so they weren't vulnerable to attacks at sea. The DOD owned the land. So at this point, the decision was made to move some of the aviation training to Millington,

Tennessee. That aviation training continued for more than 50 years here at the Naval base in --

at the Naval Air Station in Memphis.

After the base realized that a closure, which we all know as BRAC, the decision was made in 1993 and 1995 that commission shift from -- to support the variety of administrative functions. At first, the change was quite a shock, not only to the community, but to those serving here at that base. And it's no secret there were some growing pains. But since 1998 when some of our major tenants moved from D.C. and set up shop here, the base has continued to grow and provide support to any Defense Command that decides that it needs space there. But now, all our eyes are on the future.

I was asked to speak today about the challenges of BRAC and the transition, but I'll be honest with you, the Navy told Personnel a good 25 years ago to make the change, and that's what they did. It was 25 years ago. Most of the military serving today wasn't even serving back then. What remains of the Air Station is captured in old Blue Jacket Newspaper and the Millington Airport. I renewed comission -- I was

still on board the USS Artic, so I really can't speak to the transition from the Installation from '93 to '95.

What I can tell you is that 25 years later people still miss that Air Station.

Believe me, I hear it every day, and I get it.

It's visual. It's cool. It's exciting. But what we've been doing here at NSA Mid-South for the last quarter century doesn't quite -- it's not quite as cool, and it isn't, but that doesn't mean the mission carried out at the landlocked Naval base here in Tennessee isn't vital to the Navy's mission.

So to me, as the current and 14th

Commanding Officer of Navy Support Activity

Mid-South, my biggest challenge is to help people

understand what we do here and how it impacts the

Navy, and the challenge to do that when most of

what we do here isn't cool, like flying airport

-- airplanes. Every day in Mid-South, thousands

of people are working behind the scenes on

missions, and recruiting, management, logistics,

finance, and nuclear monitoring to ensure our

national security and infrastructure are

operationally ready.

NSA Mid-South and many headquartered Command stations here employ thousands of highly skilled high-ranking positions. Some of you might not have known that the economic impact of the Department of Defense here in Shelby County is 750 million dollars.

NSA Mid-South provides support to the Navy, Army, Marine Corps, Air Force, Army Corps of Engineers and the Coast Guard, not to mention our local and Reserve Guard duties. It's a total support to all military personnel and retirees in a six-state area.

It's been a quarter century since we took our new role in the Navy in supporting all branches of service here at Mid-South. We support 64 commands in our area of responsibility, which are headed here by the National Headquarters Basing Unit. Each Command are fully much more, and are executed locally, too, with a global impact. We're proud of our history, but even more proud of the mission that we are supporting here today to play a key role in the national security.

So here's a breakdown of the personnel and residents here on the base: The total

workforce of about 6500, making it one of the
largest employers in the area. It's important to
note the numbers of civilians who work here on
the base, both as civil servants and as
contractors. They outnumber our uniformed
members on base even when you include Reservists,
who only report here for drill weekends.

Our workforce provides the continuity and support for the uniform deployment that they serve to support deployment throughout the world. Most are veterans, and many have decided to make Millington and the surrounding area home to take advantage of the advantages in their lifestyle here. We have civilians on the base who have lived here for more than 20 years. Our goal here is to ensure that people can get their work done safely and securely with the resources they need.

Let's look at where the Navy is today.

Underway right now we have the Nimitz, Abraham

Lincoln, Ronald Reagan and Boxer. Those are only
the big decks that's supporting their battle

groups. You won't see the subs here, but as we
know, they're super secret about their movings.

Do we have any submarines here?

(Two Delegates raise their hands)

CAPTAIN ROSS: Okay. Well, you know more than anyone else what you all are. But now getting on back, I was just out in Guam last week working with the 44th Submarine Squadron, and she can assure you that they know what they do. So with all the ships, all the aircraft, all the bombs and weapons systems, I think we can all imagine what the Navy's most valuable critical weapon system is, and it's our people.

As I said before, most of the bombs don't get through National Security without sailors standing and watching. Ships don't get out of the way and aircraft don't take off without sailors. Naval Support Activity Mid-South supports its -- it supports the Navy's most valuable asset and most important weapons system, its people. Our new Chief of Naval Operations, Admiral Gilday, echoed this in his recent message to the fleet, and I'll let you hear what he has to say.

(A video was played)

CAPTAIN ROSS: After the video, the video of the ships, it certainly brings back memories, especially memories of an old shipmate of mine here, Rick Mahavey (phonetic). I tell you I've been doing this much too long.

Hey, so what you were just looking at was about 700,000 employees. And from NSA Mid-South, we manage more than 330,000 active duty Navy sailors from recruitment to retirement.

Additionally, at the Installation, we directly support -- this number here will probably shock a lot of you -- we support 58,000 Reservists when they are active and on the annual training for deployment. You would think how would we have that many Reservists in this area, but landlocked Tennessee has a lot going on.

So you ask: Why does that matter? So I had to break that down, as a Boats Mate would, something that I could understand. I think about a simple cup of morning coffee. The beans that make the latte have come from East Africa, through the Gulf of Aden, straight through Bab-el-Mandeb, Suez Canal, through the Strait of

Gibraltar, and then finally into New York's harbor, one of the busiest ports on the eastern seaboard, but that's more than just a cup of coffee.

It's about the livelihood and the livelihoods of our partners and friends. It's about a global treaty and the freedom to apply that treaty in a safe and free environment. Freedom seeking and freedom of navigation are vital to our economic and global security, because one stop in the free flow of goods affects millions of dollars in international trading, and that matters.

So how do we ensure to get that cup of coffee? I think you know the answer to that by now. It's the people. And if we put that in reverse order, starting going from Tennessee, Navy Personnel Command identifies a need for deployment, for a full deployed unit that will be headed to the one after her in the next month or within a year.

Navy Recruiting Command goes to work to find the qualified applicant and gets them ready for bootcamp. Then they head to A School to learn how to draw blood like any foreman would do

1 -- do we have any foremen here? -- and give you a 2 whole box of Motrin. All the while, Navy 3 manpower acknowledges the base officer will 4 determine what the sailor needs to know to be 5 successful when they get to a Command. 6 After A School, the Navy Personnel 7 Command writes an order to therefore report to 8 the destroyer so the sailor can arrive on time 9 and deploy to Africa. 10 Well, in closing this year, you can see 11 each step of the way the mission board of NSA Mid-South ensures the right sailor is at the 12 13 right place at the right time with the right 14 family. And you all can be safe knowing that we 15 have the march. Thank you for your time. Thank 16 you, again, for having me here today. And I'll 17 leave you with this last video to get you ready 18 for your conference. 19 20 (A video was played) 2.1 22 (Assembly: Clapping) 23 24 CHAIRMAN BOUDREAUX: We certainly appreciate your

18	Thank you, Shipmates. It's a pleasure to be with
19	you this morning. Talk a few minutes about the
20	education foundation, and what's happening with
21	our scholarship program.
22	The Foundation's work has all you all
23	of you that have heard me speak before know that
24	it's directly related to FRA's mission and
25	founding principles. The FRA offered

scholarships for about nearly three decades before the foundation was established 10 years ago at the 82nd National Convention.

The Foundation is a separate organization. It's a 501(c)(3), whereas FRA is a 501(c)(19) veteran's organization. We have a distinct governing documents. We have a separate board of directors and IRS designation. Our finances are maintained in separate accounts, and audited annually. Please read the Foundation National Convention Report. It's Tab T, I believe, in the delegate kit, and there's more information on what your -- your education foundation is doing.

We've been authorized to participate in the annual combined federal campaign or CFC since 2012. The CFD is administered by the Office of Personnel Management. And the opportunity to participate in the CFC was recently expanded to include retirees. So it's possible to make contributions via the My Pay account with the Defense Finance Accounting Service or DFAS.

The campaign is underway this year. It started a week ago, and it runs to 12 January 2020. The Foundation's also a member of the

Military Support Groups of America, which is a federation of military veteran's groups certified as America's best charities. It took us a number of years to get to this point, and we're very proud to be included with that federation.

These organizations meet high standards of public accountability, program efficiency and cost effectiveness. This year will be awarded 22 scholarships totaling \$93,000 to recipients in 16 states. This is thanks to Legacy Donations, individual and branch donations, and other contributions. We awarded a \$1,000 memorial scholarship in honor of Regional President, North Central, Rosemary Posekany, who died in a tragic accident last year, and we presented a new \$2,000 scholarship funded by Navy Department Branch 181.

Scholarships make a big difference in the lives of the recipients, and we need the help of all shipmates and auxiliary members to help spread awareness about the program and encourage more college bound students to apply. Please mention the foundation scholarships at branch and unit meetings, and note that the 2020 scholarship applications are now posted on the FRA website at fra.org/foundation.

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There's no secret that FRA and the Auxiliary are facing challenges with sustaining and/or growing membership. I know from experience that today our scholarship program is major interest -- is of major interest -excuse me -- to prospective members, and I urge each of you to mention education foundation scholarships when speaking to perspective members of both organizations. Yesterday at the oundations board meeting, NED, Tom Snee mentioned the fact that when he visits and speaks at the Senior Enlisted Academy that there's always a real positive reaction to the fact that the FRA and the LA FRA have scholarship programs. This is a very high-interest item, and please remember to touch on that when you're interacting with perspective members, speaking with active duty groups, and so on.

The cost of education continues to rise, and there's a growing need for assistance. The last weekend I read a US Today copy in the hotel, and screaming at the headline was the headline that stated that the average student debt is at a record \$29,200. It's no secret that education is very, very important, and it's also no secret

that it costs a lot of money. Captain Ross spoke about the importance of people, very important to keep that in mind, and the fact that educating shipmates or family members, students, what have you, that's a key, key aspect of family life, and it's a very major concern to everyone and their families, so please keep that in mind.

The Foundation takes pride in maintaining low administrative costs in conjunction with this program. We're fortunate to have dedicated volunteers to make this possible.

Corporate and individual contributions of any amount are tax deductible, and we thank the National President for presenting a recognition letter acknowledging a contribution in the Captain's name to the Education Foundation.

Thank you very much, Shipmate Cocke.

We also appreciate the West Coast region taking a collection at their annual convention for money and support of the Foundation's scholarships.

It's also helpful to contact guidance departments at local high schools to tell them about the program. If you need some handouts, contact National Headquarters and/or our

scholarships coordinator, Alicia Landis, and we'll get some brochures and flyers out to you.

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It's also important the participants in the Americanism essay contest, particularly 11th and 12th graders, be apprised to the program.

Finally, I wanted to talk a minute about Amazon Smile. The Amazon Smile program contributes one half of a percent of qualifying purchases to designated charitable organizations. The Education Foundation is registered in that program, and those that select the Foundation through a special web address will help Amazon provide support for future awards.
